What a great competition it was. Our volunteer judges Sandra Ferguson, Janet Leech and Rosemary Brown are all keen horticulturalists and all commented on what a great variety of gardens they have seen throughout the summer months, ranging from smaller sized gardens just filled with pots to large ones which are divided into different sections to secret gardens.

Each garden was a joy to see and we would like to congratulate everyone who took part and the gardens they created. All participants were invited to an Awards Presentation evening where Town Mayor, Cllr Barbara Russel presented the winners with their prizes.

After much deliberation and debate the judges awarded the following:

We also had two 'Young Gardener' entries this year in the Edible Garden category, which was won by three year old, Miss Emily Telfer, who grew carrots, peas and lots of other vegetables in her garden bed and planted marigold plants to distract the slugs and snails from her vegetables. It is great to meet the next generation of gardeners and we are looking forward to receiving more 'Young Gardener' entries next year.

Once again the 'Best Communal Garden' category, which was merged together with 'Commercial Planting', was the hardest to judge and caused the most debate and deliberation between the judges.

The overall winner of the 'Best Communal Garden Mayor's Cup' was Friars Square. The team plant an area in the middle of the car park every year, and this year they incorporated a theme of the 400th anniversary of Shakespeare's death into their planting and design.

We would also like to mention the residents from Sycamore Court who were awarded 2nd place in the Communal Garden Category, Tony Robinson from the Canalside Garden received 3rd and the Florence Nightingale Hospice and The King's Head both received a Highly Commended award. One thing is for sure, all of these gardens bring lots of joy, not only to those who look after it but also to passers-by and residents.

Then it was time to award the 'Overall Best Garden' winner in the resident's category. As the standard was extremely high this year the judges had some lengthy conversations before a majority decision was reached.

The 'Overall Best Garden'

winner of the crystal trophy was awarded to Mr Ron Murray. The judges described his garden as an oasis for wildlife, which can enjoy the many bird feeders, the big pond, the mature trees and nectar rich plants. The garden is combined with a large vegetable patch, which is packed full with



vegetables, fruit trees and bushes. Everything you need to feed family and friends.

The 'Newcomer Award' was given to Mrs Irina Gainullina for her enthusiasm and the fantastic roses she is growing, which are as tall as her garage by now.

The runner-up and commendation prizes were also awarded to the recipients during the awards presentation, which took place at the Railway Club.

The judges reiterated that all the gardens they had seen throughout the summer were simply stunning and they enjoyed seeing the great effort everyone puts in, but there has to be a winner in each category. Sandra, Janet and Rosemary are already looking forward to next year's judging days and seeing how the gardens are progressing.

Congratulations to everyone who took part and a big thank you to our judges who gave up their time for several days to see the gardens.

The 2016 Aylesbury Town Council (ATC) Allotments Awards were held in October at the Railway Club, Aylesbury.

We are very grateful to this year's judges, Alderman Ray James (Allotment Warden – Crown Leys) and Joe Benham (Secretary, Aylesbury Gardening Society) for spending time in July, on what was probably the hottest week in the month, judging the allotment plots.

With a very wet start to the season, followed by warm and very dry summer months, it has been a mixed year for our allotment holders, with success for some and others looking forward to something better next year.

The criteria for judging extended beyond simply considering the general appearance of a plot. They included the desirability for varied planting (a mixture of vegetables, fruits and flowers) and also considered factors such as composting and cleanliness.

The judges awarded prizes to the best three plots at each site, with additional prizes for Best Newcomer and Overall Winner. The presentations were made by The Mayor, Cllr Barbara Russel with the 1st place winners receiving an engraved shield. In addition, prize winners received a certificate and vouchers, which were kindly donated by the Aylesbury Gardening Society.

Summer Playscheme 2016



Virtual Dementia



ATC's Dementia Champion stepped into the shoes of a Dementia sufferer. "To witness someone living with Dementia is one thing, but to physically live with Dementia for a short while seems inconceivable. On 21 September, for eight minutes my world altered. Myself and a group of volunteers participated in a

Virtual Dementia Tour at Avondale Care Home in Aylesbury which was held in support of World Alzheimer's Day.

Wearing a large glove on my dominant hand with fingerholes sewn together to simulate struggling with motor skills; carpet-grip insoles (spike side up) to give the sensation of peripheral neuropathy (pins and needles), sunglasses which blocked my peripheral vision and obstructed my general eyesight, and a set of headphones emitting various levels of white noise in addition to the random wail of a fire engine and a phone ringing at high pitch. I was about to start living with Dementia.

It was very noisy. I didn't know where to turn. Someone I didn't know grabbed my arm and said something to me. What they said I do not know. The shrill of the fire engine startled me. I swore, but no one was there to comfort me. I swore again – because the phone rang. My feet were starting to hurt, but I couldn't sit down. I was alone. And now I was scared.

This experience only lasted for eight minutes, but will stay with me forever. We cannot begin to imagine how someone who has Dementia spends their day. I was only in one room. How would that be if I were in a house? How would that be if I went into town to run an errand as simple as collecting a prescription?

Aylesbury has always been a community-centric town. As businesses, faith groups, schools, community groups, friends and family we can continue to be just that.

Friday 7 October saw masked heroes appearing all over Aylesbury, as the local community took part in Masks for MASKS day.

Masks for MASKS is an annual event which invites people to wear a fun, colourful mask for a donation of £1 to Aylesbury charity MASKS (Make A Special Kid Smile). The local charity supports The Vale Federation of special schools in Aylesbury, Booker Park and Stocklake Park schools. MASKS provides the means to enhance and improve the lives of the students aged between 3 and 19 years, who have a range of learning difficulties.

The schools in the Federation entered into the spirit of the day with staff and students wearing an impressive array of colourful and creative masks, plus various local businesses also wore their masks in support.

Rhapsody Hairdressing in Aylesbury, the Black Boy at Oving, Parrott Bros Butchers in Whitchurch and Equitable Life were among the local businesses to take part in the event.

The total raised was in excess of £500, which will be put towards building a Multi-Use Games Area at two school sites.

Chris Stephenson, Federation Principal said: "This is the second year we've held this fundraising day and it is something we hope to build on each year. It was wonderful to see the fantastic selection of masks worn by our students and we were delighted that the local community also took part. I am thrilled with the total raised; thank you to everyone that got involved."

Walk the MS Mile Raises £20,000

The Chilterns MS Centre 'Walk the MS Mile' came to Aylesbury on the final day of their five day fundraiser in September, with 140 walkers tackling the mile long route around the town centre. The walk was opened by MP David Lidington and the people of Aylesbury generously put their hands in their pockets to donate to the Wendover based charity, helping them to smash their £15,000 target and raise £20,000.



The Walk the MS Mile sponsored walks, which also took place in Thame, Berkhamsted, Marlow and Buckingham, have helped to raise awareness of, and funds for, the Chilterns MS Centre that supports people in the local community with Multiple Sclerosis (MS). Aylesbury resident Lois Macbeth regularly has physiotherapy at the Centre which helps with her MS symptoms like stiffness

and mobility problems, she said "Thanks to the people of Aylesbury for getting behind us, the Centre is such an amazing place". Some of the walkers were regular visitors to the Centre, others have never been there, have no connection to MS, but saw or heard the advertising and were moved to do something for a local charity.

Local businesses, supermarkets and groups also supported this local, independent charity by providing marshals, refreshments, sponsorship and advertising the walks.

The Centre provides practical, physical and emotional support to anyone who is affected by the condition and the £20,000 will enable the delivery of 600 hours of treatment to a local person with MS.





Sight Loss and Disability Charity opens in Aylesbury

Just imagine... how hard everyday tasks are when you use a wheelchair and have multiple disabilities. Then think about what it is like when you also have sight loss.

SeeAbility has been supporting people with sight loss and multiple disabilities to live as independently as possible for over 200 years. We help people maintain and learn skills, make choices and do those everyday things they want in life.

SeeAbility is about to open Waterside House, Aylesbury with fourteen specially designed flats for people with sight loss and multiple disabilities.

If you have sight loss and disabilities, there will be specific things you need to settle in. Funding from local authorities covers essentials but it is charitable support that enables us to enrich and change people's lives.



Meet Mark, who lives in a specially designed SeeAbility flat. After he moved in he said he wanted to let friends in and make them tea. Things you might do without thinking. Relay For Life Aylesbury Raises £105,000

Relay For Life Aylesbury 2016 has broken the £100,000 barrier for the third year in succession – and won a special commendation from Cancer Research UK (CRUK) for its efforts.

The total was announced on Friday 15 September, when it was revealed that the 25 teams of 501 relayers had raised £105,035.46 both during the 24-hour event, and with numerous fundraising events throughout the year.

Since Relay launched in Aylesbury in 2009 the event has now raised an amazing £553,014.46.

Lucy Edie, Senior Manager for Cancer Research UK, presented Relay For Life Aylesbury, with a Flame of Hope Special Commendation for Fundraising in the Community. There were over 500 nominations for this award and it was presented to Aylesbury in recognition of its achievements:

"It's a staggering amount of money to raise and we know at CRUK how much hard work has gone into every single pound of it. There are very few Relays that raise more than £100,000 so it puts Aylesbury on the map of fundraising Relays in the country. But also, the thing that struck me, both at the weekend and here tonight, is the incredible atmosphere, energy and camaraderie that I think Aylesbury does brilliantly and that's why you are such worthy winners of the Flame of Hope Special Commendation," said Lucy Edie.

Relay For Life Aylesbury, Chair Paul Kirby said the amount raised in 2016 is unbelievable: "Our teams, supporters, their friends and families continue to amaze us every year with their incredible hard work and effort. As a committee we have been blown away by the Fundraising in The Community Special Commendation Award. I love what we do and I couldn't be prouder of the event we create. We are all raising money with one aim – to beat cancer sooner – and we can't thank the people of Aylesbury enough for their support."

Heritage Flame Ceremony & Celebration

On 29 July 1948, the day of the Opening Ceremony of the London 1948 Olympic Games, Dr Ludwig Guttmann organised the first competition for wheelchair athletes which he named the Stoke Mandeville Games, a milestone in Paralympic history.

Twelve years later, in 1960, these games became the Paralympic Games, taking place for the first time in Rome. The event featured 400 athletes from 23 countries. Since then it has taken place every four years. In 1976, the first Winter Paralympic Games were held in Sweden, and as with the Summer Games, have taken place every four years. This year the Rio 2016 Paralympic Games featured 1,450 athletes from 161 countries, which demonstrates just how much the movement has grown and developed over the past 68 years, continuing Dr Guttmann's vision to transform the lives of people with impairment through sport, into something that today is widely regarded as the world's number one event for driving social inclusion.

A spectacular day of activities took place on 2 September marking Aylesbury's unique role as the birthplace of the Paralympic movement.

At Stoke Mandeville Stadium during a colourful ceremony in front of 1,500 people, the Heritage Flame was ignited for just the second time, starting its journey to Brazil to help begin the Rio 2016 Paralympic Games. Professional dancers and performers were joined by volunteers, with former wheelchair racer, Baroness Grey-Thompson DBE

and skier Kelly Gallagher MBE taking centre stage. The theme was 'Seeds of Diversity', celebrating how the first Stoke Mandeville Games organised by Sir Ludwig Guttmann in 1948 have blossomed into a worldwide sporting phenomenon. This event followed the very popular ParalympicsGB Carnival, during which hundreds of visitors to the stadium throughout the day tried out some of the activities taking place at Rio 2016 and found out more about getting involved in local sporting opportunities.

Later in the evening, Vale Park was the setting for a spectacular community event, which ensured inclusivity for all with an accessible fun-fair, demonstrations, displays and a vibrant Rio style carnival parade, featuring over 300 local people with a wide range of disabilities, each of whom had created colourful and illuminating banners and artworks. The entire day's celebration, culminated in a fantastic firework display which was ignited by the Paralympic Heritage Flame which had made its way around the park and community with a unique 'Passing of the Flame', in which hundreds of local people took part.

The day's events were organised by Aylesbury Town Council, Aylesbury Vale District Council, the British Paralympic Association and Wheelpower, and supported by Bucks Disability Service and Bucks County Council.

The programme provides young people with the chance to challenge themselves, overcome some of their fears, develop their team work, leadership and communication skills. Most importantly the programme shows young people the impact they can make to benefit others by getting more involved in their own community through the social action project element. This summer, during their social action week, the young people raised an amazing £18,000 for thirteen local organisations who were also presented with their cheques at the ceremony.
