

ATC Grants - September 2008

Aylesbury Hospital Radio entertains the patients and staff at Stoke Mandeville Hospital as well as informing them of events in and outside the hospital. The staff collect music requests daily, give updates on local and national news and provide a good lifeline for the staff and patients on the wards. £2,000 was granted towards the cost of moving premises and providing new equipment.

The Healthy Living Centre promotes the health and wellbeing of the people living in the Southcourt and Walton Court area. They were awarded £940 towards replacing and installing a new stove and range. Equipping a community café with the appropriate kitchen equipment will enable the promotion of a healthy diet, provide a venue to reduce social isolation and support activities in the café such as young peoples' drop-in, breast feeding support and older peoples' services.

A cheque for £1,000 was presented to Youth Concern by Cllr Mark Willis, Chairman of Aylesbury Town Council's Grants Committee. Funding was requested towards providing a programme of free positive activities during the summer holidays, a Rock Festival Project and Young Peoples' Art Exhibition.

The Uptown Coffee Bar is a Drop-In Centre for young people between the ages of 13 and 25 years. They deal with between 50 and 90 youngsters in a less formal atmosphere offering counselling and help with complex issues. They have recently moved from their old position in the Market Square to a building near Whitehill Surgery on the Oxford Road.

Cllr Willis said "This grant has helped the Uptown Coffee Bar to provide creative activities for its patrons.

It provides help and support to some of the town's most vulnerable young people and the Town Council are happy to support its vital work."

On August 22nd Cllr Mrs Denise Summers presented a cheque for £1,142 to 1st Aylesbury Scout Group at their Scout hut in Osier Way. The funding was needed to help towards installing a new kitchen. Beavers, Cubs and Scouts will learn how to cook simple meals and eat healthily in a safe and clean environment.

Cllr Mrs Denise Summers said "It was a wonderful opportunity to present the cheque to the Scouts and especially to see girl Scouts. They are all eagerly awaiting the new kitchen to enable them to get their cookery badges. They were very grateful to Aylesbury Town Council for the grant to enable them to start this project."

This year Queens Park Arts Centre staged a Vernon Scannell Poetry Event in October and were granted £1,500 by Aylesbury Town Council. The activities took place at the Centre and involved local schools.

Queens Park exists to provide, promote and develop participatory arts to the people of Aylesbury and surrounding areas. They encourage the widest participation in affordable arts, crafts, theatre, music, comedy and dance for the local community.

Britain in Bloom

Every year the Royal Horticultural Society holds the 'Britain in Bloom' competition. This encourages towns and villages to take a critical look at their streets, parks and open spaces to see if they are at their best. Aylesbury Town Council has entered the competition for the last three years and each time has received a higher award than the preceding year.

Last winter members and officers of Aylesbury Town Council planned floral displays and roadside upgrades for the summer displays. The outcome of their hard work was the most glorious display of flowers and shrubs ever seen in Aylesbury.

Throughout the spring and summer residents and visitors delivered a constant stream of comments of appreciation and enjoyment of the roundabout beds, planters, troughs and hanging baskets which brightened up the Town Centre.


The outcome was a Silver Gilt award in the Regional Britain in Bloom Competition, and a Special Regional Award in recognition of our outstanding roundabouts, roadsides and verges.

Some of this work was undertaken in partnership with Bucks County Council. Special mention should be made of their magnificent recycling plant at Rabans Lane, which is a superb amenity for residents of Aylesbury.

Over the following pages we take a look back at the summer floral displays which generated so much pleasure. The Town Council would like to thank the many sectors of our society which contributed to the overall effect. These include allotment holders, shops, offices, inns, local public bodies, and the people of Aylesbury.

We hope that next year even more residents, public authorities, and retail and commercial establishments will take part in making Aylesbury even more stunning than it has been in 2008.

Summer 2007

Roundabouts and Roadsides

Most of the town's roundabouts attract sponsorship. All but six of the roundabouts are marketed by a commercial company commissioned by Bucks County Council. Six are maintained by ATC who also obtain commercial sponsorship to the extent that they are nearly covering the cost of maintenance. These six are planted for winter, spring and summer bedding and have all been improved this year.

The flagship is the Exchange Street roundabout which this year was planted with a floral tribute to the Aylesbury Duck. Approximately 60 roadside planters were installed around the inner relief road (now known as 'The Hub'). Additionally 60 metres of railing planters were installed around the Exchange Street roundabout. AVDC supplied 90 hanging baskets and the Town Council supplied another 291.

AVDC and ATC worked in partnership to recover roadside bedding owned by BCC on the High Street, Upper Hundreds Way, Cambridge and Friarage Road underpasses and Park Street. Upper Hundreds Way and Park Street were planted with 1,130 shrubs and herbaceous plants which it is hoped, will provide a spectacular display of colour year after year.

Commercial and retail participation in Britain in Bloom is growing in Aylesbury. In 2007, 50 retailers sported hanging baskets outside their premises; this year the total rose to 150. New-build apartment blocks are being attractively landscaped and the premises of HBOS, Aylesbury's largest commercial employer, are surrounded by several acres of beautifully landscaped gardens, shrubberies and parkland. It all contributes to the general impression of Aylesbury as a green and tranquil town.

AYLESBURY VALE DISTRICT COUNCIL

Leisure & Cultural Services is working towards implementing the long term renovation plan for Vale Park and thanks to significant external grant aid, much has changed in the Park over the last couple of years. A new play area was constructed in 2006 and in 2007 a grant of over £500,000 from Communities and Local Government (CLG) has been used to create a new bowls green and tennis, football and basketball courts along with new equipment for teenage play. There are seven major parks in Aylesbury, all under development, and a significant number of green open spaces. This year 3 new play areas and multi-use games areas were installed in three of these parks.

Aylesbury Riverside Walk

Another aspect of Aylesbury's entry to Britain in Bloom is the variety of areas of bio-diversity around the town. One example is the Riverside Walk. The Riverside Walk provides a significant contribution to the Aylesbury Linear Park and hosts part of the Round Aylesbury Walk. The site covers approximately 18 hectares and runs alongside the River Thame. Until the 1980s the site was farmland and included areas of formal and informal recreation along with semi-rural habitats. Overall the site has been kept low-key in terms of formal facilities given its rural nature on the outskirts of the town.

Regular winter flooding provides good feeding grounds for wetland birds such as Snipe and Curlew. Biological surveys of the area have been carried out and in 2002 the rare Leisler's bat was recorded. A walk should provide the opportunity to spot the Guelder Rose, Field Maple, Oak, Black Poplar, Wayfaring Tree and Hazel; and birds

that may be spotted include Snipe, Great Tit, Linnet, Reed Bunting, Blue Tit and the

Song Thrush.

Mowing regimes include short mown amenity grass, short mown strips adjacent to paths, areas cut once or twice a year and areas which are not cut to allow the development of wetland or scrub. This year a significant programme was undertaken

in the removal of ragwort, dock and thistle. Additionally thousands of bulbs have been planted - mainly fritillaries. Woodland management includes the gradual thinning of non-native species, coppicing of woodland, planting and gapping up and the creation of a Black Poplar woodland.

During 2007-8 a further 2,000 Black Poplar, Alder, Native Privet, Dogwood and Birch have been planted. Since 1991 ongoing community involvement has been a feature of this project with an annual programme of activities which includes practical conservation, bat watch and beetle search.

AVDC has planted over 100,000 bulbs, mainly daffodils and native bluebells in several biodiversity areas. A further 1,000 wildflowers including ox-eye daisy, ragged robin and birdsfoot trefoil have been planted this year. They also introduced 500 spring flowering trees, such as cherries.



Allotments

Allotments form an important component of Aylesbury's submissions to Britain in Bloom. Aylesbury residents are enthusiastic allotment gardeners. They appreciate the healthy outdoor exercise and the benefits of chemicalfree cultivation. On a sunny day a walk through one of the sites will reveal whole families of residents (including grannies, granddads, parents and children) of different nationalities happily toiling away, producing their own food. Amongst our plot holders, in addition to indigenous tenants, we have numerous Kashmiris, Pushtans, Italians, West Indians, North and South Africans, Czechs, Poles and Lithuanians. It is good to see immigrants, particularly the newer arrivals, engaging with the environment and being assimilated in this way. It is also extremely good to see that the women of some of the minorities, who generally remain within the household, feel confident enough to go to the sites and work there unescorted. The sense of camaraderie that allotment cultivation seems to engender is very much in evidence. Social pleasantries are the order of the day and surplus produce is exchanged. New varieties of seeds and plants are discussed over mugs of tea and there is a general sense of contentment and well-being. However, when the 'Aylesbury in Bloom' allotment competition comes round each year, it is then every man (or woman) for himself!

The Council currently has a programme of expanding its allotments stock and reclaiming land to create more plots for residents. In 2002 ATC took over 500 allotment plots on six sites from AVDC. Since then another 100 have been created. Of the present 600 plots owned by the Town Council, 200 are 10 pole in size. Extending to roughly 100 sq metres, these plots are generally considered to be too large for modern allotment holders. The Council is systematically converting 10 pole plots to 5 pole, or roughly 50 sq metres per tenant. This means that within the next five years the Council will have 700 plots to let.

The Town Council is additionally in the process of taking over the Bierton Road Allotments site. This offers 80 plots, a number of which are unoccupied. Bierton Road plots are all 10 pole, and will gradually be converted to 5 pole, thus creating another 80 allotments. This will increase the Town Council offer to 860 plots, which is considerably above the national average.


A photographic look back at events this summer...



20 years of Jigsaw Theatre

Jigsaw was founded twenty years ago by a group of disabled people who had briefly savoured the limelight at school and college and wanted to do more. They found that there were no opportunities for them to get involved in mainstream performing arts. So with help from local arts funders they created their own!

Jigsaw has started a tradition of workshops in acting, backstage management and workshop leading courses designed for disabled practitioners of any severity and intends to continue for many years to come. These workshops have been brought to many day centres throughout Buckinghamshire.

The founders had no idea that it would carry on for 20 years and during that time they would put together so many creative productions. The support and enthusiasm generated by the group was so much greater than expected. About two hundred people, involved from the beginning, have carried the project forward. Gill Gerhardi, Jigsaw's Artistic Director said: "We are all amazed, enthralled and enthused by our massive achievement. We have had a wonderful time throughout those 20 years and when we asked our current actors how they would best like to describe their time with Jigsaw they replied 'fun, fun, fun!' They love it all, which is really good to know, and good for all the funders, facilitators and past actors to know."



Trim your Heating Bills

In July 2008, the UK's largest domestic energy supplier warned that gas bills could rise by up to 35% in 2008. This continues the upward trend in household gas and electricity costs since 2005. Can we do anything to slow down these rising energy costs? As space and water heating account for around 60% of the energy used in the average home, this is a good place to start.



Follow these 5 tips to trim your heating bills:

- 1. Use your programmer to switch the heating and hot water on and off and set your thermostat at between 18° and 21° C. Every 1° C above this increases your heating bill by 10%.
- 2. Avoid using the immersion heater to heat water. The relatively high unit cost of electricity makes it more cost-effective to use your gas boiler for this.
- 3. Switch supplier or switch tariff. If you have Economy 7, time your washing machine and dishwasher to exploit the cheaper night-time electricity tariff.
- 4. Make the most of each use of a given appliance. Wash clothes and dishes when you have a full load ready to go. Switch things off when not in use.
- 5. Insulate your home. Energy Saving Trust now estimates annual savings of £160 from installing cavity wall insulation. This is currently free to over 70s.


