



Britain in Bloom

Throughout the year Aylesbury Town Council provides floral displays on roundabouts and in flower troughs in the Town Centre, and this winter has been no exception. Residents have commented on the gorgeous displays of pansies in the troughs and daffodils and polyanthus on the verges and roundabouts.

Now, however, we are getting ready for the big event of the summer – Aylesbury's entry to Britain in Bloom. First things first, so we started with conditioning the soil. ATC was contacted and was offered 20 tons of horse manure for free if arrangements could be made to collect it.

Into the breach stepped Clancy Docwra, a major supplier of services to Utilities, Civil Engineering, Rail and the Building industry, who immediately agreed to help. On an overcast Wednesday morning a Clancy Docwra lorry turned up before 8.00am and decanted 20 tons of fine manure.

Within hours the manure had been distributed around the allotment site by keen plot holders wishing to improve their soil in order to grow bigger and tastier crops.

The popular **Charter Day** is on Sunday 13 September from 11.00am to 4.00pm when Aylesbury holds a mediaeval fair to celebrate the granting of its Charter.

Family favourites like the Ratcatcher, the Plague Singers and the Body Snatchers will be on hand, together with a variety of craftspeople demonstrating how different artefacts were made in days of yore.

Bearbrook challenge

The new Bourg Walk Bridge links the centre of Town with Southcourt and Aylesbury College. A substantial amount of money was invested in the path from the end of the bridge to the College, improving lighting and surfaces, but the area remained unattractive.

In the weeks before the official opening of the new bridge, Aylesbury Town Council was already auditing various walking routes into the Town Centre. One of them particularly stood out as needing attention. This was the path to the College, which also provides a route for Henry Floyd pupils and many commuters.

The Town Council surveyed the site and realised that a number of projects would have to be undertaken to ensure that the walk and cycle way would be considered safe and provide a pleasant route to travel along. These pictures show how overgrown the brook was and how much rubbish had accumulated on its banks.

A meeting of Town Council Officers with the PCSOs (Police Community Support Officer) for the area established that they and Aylesbury College were in the process of organising a clean-up. Together they contacted Aylesbury Constabulary, the Environment Agency, Aylesbury Vale District Council, Vale of Aylesbury Housing Trust, the Fire Service and the local Residents' Association. The group decided to tackle all the problems and an overall plan for the area was agreed. On 26 March Aylesbury Town Council supplied men and machines to cut back the matted banks and the overhanging trees and hedges. Cleared green waste was chipped on site and given to the horticultural section of the College.

The Environment Agency collected some of the rubbish (including shopping trolleys and old tyres) which were disposed of by AVDC. Aylesbury Police Officers, PCSOs, members of the Fire Authority, ATC staff and College students pulled on their waders and set about clearing the banks of the stream of many years worth of accumulated litter.

Benches were given a fresh coat of paint and ugly graffiti was removed. Members of the Residents' Association litter-picked the area. AVDC put up new bird boxes. In the autumn the Town Council will provide shrubs and bulbs as part of an on-going programme of improvement.

The path is now much cleaner and brighter, allowing residents to enjoy a brisk walk or cycle ride into Town in pleasant, attractive surroundings.

Aylesbury College Green Day

Aylesbury College held a 'green' Open Day on 26 March to emphasise the College's commitment to reducing the carbon footprint of Aylesbury. Cllr Mrs Penni Thorne, Mayor of Aylesbury, planted the first of 75 sponsored trees in the College grounds.

Inside the huge glass atrium was a range of exhibitions, with stands demonstrating composting and home food production and others supporting car sharing, recycling and fair trade. Cycle Aylesbury were there, convincing visitors of the convenience and health benefits of cycling. A free bike repair service was on offer.

BCTV, the charity for environmental and conservation volunteering throughout the UK were present, as were Oxfam. There were organic food cookery demonstrations and those present could visit the College's new wildlife centre. Keeping up Appearances

As part of a Town Centre Action Group initiative Aylesbury Town Council will be giving the bollards in the Market Square a fresh coat of paint, ready for the summer. The Market Square has also benefited from re-laying of some of the cobbles where very uneven patches had developed, and the replacement of some patches of tarmac with Denner Hill setts.

The statues have had a wash, whether they needed it or not, and pretty floral hanging baskets will add a splash of colour to the Square.

February newsletter from the Walton Court, Southcourt and Hawkslade Neighbourhood Policing Team

In response to problems with speeding, eight speed monitoring operations have taken place, focussed on Ellen Road and Churchill Avenue. Results include vehicle seizures, fifteen fines and two court cases.

Operation Falcon relating to tackling drug crime resulted in one hundred and forty subjects searched with two males being sentenced to between four and a half to six and a half years imprisonment, and an eviction from a Vale of Aylesbury Housing Trust Property.

Other operations included Operation Blunt, which was carried out at one school and Aylesbury College. This is aimed at tackling knife crime culture, and reducing the number of youngsters carrying knives. Working in partnership with New Destiny Trust, the Team have now been able to educate three more schools. They hope to deliver this message to more schools during the year.

Crime prevention advice has been given, as well as timer light bulbs, to assist the Team with Operation Accurist to target night-time burglars.

Over the past year the Team have taken part in as much community engagement as possible, becoming involved with the Muslim ladies group at the Healthy Living Centre on Walton Court; Aylesbury Youth for Christ; Southcourt music studios and the 'Fatal Distraction' production at Mandeville School. Two PCSOs have been adopted by area churches and eight police surgeries were conducted for residents to ask questions and voice their opinions.

Crime prevention initiatives included seventy four bicycles being permanently marked at Ashmead Combined School; three truancy sweeps, and five new Neighbourhood Watch schemes being set up.



With the help of partner agencies Oak Green alleyway was cleared of graffiti and drugs paraphernalia, hedges were trimmed on Hawkslade estate, and four antisocial behavioural contracts have been given by the Housing Trust.

The Team welcome any new ideas the public may have for the forthcoming year that will enable them to continue to engage well within the community. Cycle Aylesbury – Raised Crossings and Cycle Crossovers

As part of our commitment to improving cycling facilities in Aylesbury, the Cycle Aylesbury team have been making a number of improvements to the continuity and profile of the Gemstone cycle network.

Taking advice from Sustrans and Cycling England and adapting examples used at other towns across the country, a number of new cycling crossovers and raised crossings have been installed. We have responded to comments from residents and cycling groups with concerns that cyclists were not safely crossing roads on the Gemstone cycle routes.

The following information describes the role of red surfacing and raised crossings and provides information on how they should be used:

Red surfacing has been applied across roads to show the continuation of the cycle ways. The routes are now complete and the red surfacing lets drivers see cyclists and pedestrians approaching. It is hoped that motorists will be more considerate and allow them to cross when they are waiting. The red surfacing does not provide increased priority for cyclists but it does show that a crossing is approaching. The 'SLOW'



markings, give way triangles and paving on the cycle ways are all refreshed to make it clearer to cyclists that they are approaching a crossing and that they will need to take care as they cross the road.

Raised crossings raise the profile of the road to the same height as the cycle way and provide a level crossing point. Red surfacing shows that cyclists will be crossing but does not give extra priority for cyclists. Motorists should see cyclists and pedestrians approaching the crossing point and allow them to cross when they are waiting. For more information please visit: www.cycleaylesbury.co.uk

If you have applied to a higher education institute and your grades are lower than your offer, call the admissions team as soon as you can to see whether they will still accept you.


You shouldn't feel pressurised into going to University just because everyone else seems to be. There is

Want to start earning?

Apprenticeships allow you to start work and earn a decent wage, while learning new skills that will lead to nationally recognised qualifications. Reactivate Bucks! Community Challenge



Would you like to *Reactivate* your community or workplace?

'Reactivate Bucks!' is a campaign to use the power and inspiration of the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games to get more people in Bucks participating in sport.

The Community and Workplace Challenge is a key element of the campaign and challenges local businesses and communities to get more active, backed up by a package of support, resources and incentives provided by Bucks Sport and our partners.

The Challenge:

Businesses, Parish and Town Councils, and other relevant community groups are invited to take up the Reactivate Bucks! Community Challenge. You will need to identify a member of the community to be our contact person and the voluntary 'Reactivator' for your area, who will help identify and promote existing opportunities to get active in your community.

It is hoped that you will establish at least 1 new activity per year in your area, identify people who would like to gain a skill through training to lead sessions, and provide monitoring information to feed back to our funders as appropriate.

For older people in your community, join our Active4life campaign, providing activities for 50+, or for younger people, funding may be available through our Sport Unlimited project. We can offer support to establish a new mass participation event as part of our 'Take to the Streets' campaign. We will provide training and mentoring support for sports leadership and coaching.

Quarrendon Leas

To many, Quarrendon is a suburb of Aylesbury built in the 1950s and extended in the 1980s, but, in fact, the name comes from a deserted village situated on the other side of the River Thame. It may have derived from the Old English Cweorndun meaning 'hill where mill stones are obtained'. There is evidence to suggest that the village dates back to Anglo Saxon times, as the village was reputedly the birthplace of local saint St Osyth.

Quarrendon is an outstanding example of an English village that was depopulated in the 16th century and redeveloped in Tudor times with the construction of a grand manor with moat and landscape incorporating much of the site of the village and its chapel. Fortunately, because the area has been maintained as grassland for over three centuries, the outline of these features has largely been preserved.

Quarrendon Leas is protected by law as a scheduled ancient monument, but over the next few years will be affected by housing developments at Berryfields to the west and Weedon Hill to the east. However, a legal agreement allows Quarrendon Leas to be transferred from its current owners, Taylor-Wimpey, to the newly formed Buckinghamshire Conservation Trust once 300 houses have been occupied at Berryfields.

The Buckinghamshire Conservation Trust has been set up by Buckinghamshire County Council, with the support of Aylesbury Town Council and the Buckinghamshire Archaeological Society, to help conserve and enhance the County's historic and natural heritage, and promote public appreciation of this rich inheritance. Its first project is to care for the ancient monument at Quarrendon Leas, and with funding from Aylesbury Vale Advantage, Buckinghamshire County Council and English Heritage, work is underway to improve public access within the site with a new path. This will be suitable for disabled users and will run for 700m from the eastern edge of the new Berryfields development, past the ruined church of St Peter, to a water-filled moat, which is believed to have encircled a mansion built by Sir Henry Lee in the 16th century. The new path follows the historic road into Quarrendon from Berryfields Lane, which before the 18th century was the main Aylesbury to Buckingham Road.

Sir Henry Lee used this approach to show off his wealth to best effect. The Lee family had become wealthy through the cattle business and as a consequence, gained access to the royal court enabling Sir Henry to become a favourite of Elizabeth I. She was reputedly entertained at Quarrendon Manor by Sir Henry in 1592. At Quarrendon, the Lees replaced the old mediaeval village with a mansion, a grand water garden featuring high embanked walkways, and an elaborate rabbit warren, making it a pleasure-ground fit to entertain royalty.



Sir Henry eventually went bankrupt, leaving the mansion and gardens to fall into disrepair but, unlike most grand Tudor houses, nothing was constructed over it so the historic ruins and gardens are still visible. A farm replaced the mansion, but this was eventually demolished in the 1970s.

The only remaining building in the old village is the ruined church of St Peter which in an early 19th century magazine article was described as 'a melancholy object of contemplation'. Until the 1930s there were substantial remains – old aisles with octagonal piers and double-chamfered arches. All that remains now are two low sections of wall and the foot of one of the south aisle buttresses.

Over the next few years Quarrendon Leas will be enhanced with interpretation boards and will prove to be a great asset to the people of Aylesbury.

Bucks Fifty Plus Forum

The Bucks Fifty Plus Forum is an umbrella organisation for a number of autonomous older people's action groups around the county of Buckinghamshire.

A recent report written by John Elbourne, 'Review of Older People's engagement with Government', made a number of key recommendations and the subsequent Government response, 'Empowering Engagement: A stronger voice for older people', reports their vision for future strategy. At the heart of the response, the Government supports the case for a new 'UK Advisory Council on Ageing' to provide a stronger, clearer and louder voice for older people at a National level. Regional Forums on Ageing will be set up, where they do not already exist. The Government also plans to strengthen the network of local authority Forums; to encourage the appointment of local authority champions, and to support the setting up of local forums where none exist. This will help to ensure that older people can have real influence on the development of local services and policies.

This structure already exists in Buckinghamshire and the Bucks Fifty Plus Forum is cited as a respondent to the original report by John Elbourne. Groups already exist in Burnham, Chesham, Marlow, Marlow Bottom, Chalfont St Peter, Old Amersham, Stokenchurch and Lane End and are involved in a diverse range of campaigns to ensure good service provision for the elderly in their areas.

How smart is your driving?

Most car drivers could be travelling a lot further on a tank of fuel. No new car is required – just a change to smarter driving. Try these tips:

- Shift up the gears earlier (between 2000 and 2500rpm). Cruising comfortably in 5th gear is the best place to be.
- Cut your top speed. Wind resistance increases significantly with speed. The optimum speed for fuel efficiency is 45 50mph.
- Avoid unnecessary braking by anticipating the traffic ahead. Fluid motion is better than stop start.
- When slowing down, stay in gear and take your foot off the accelerator as early as possible. This reduces fuel consumption to near zero.
- Plan your route to avoid congestion or getting lost.

ATC Grants - March 2009

Aylesbury Vale Youth Theatre is a theatre company involving people aged between 16 and 21 years in every aspect of theatre-making, from acting, directing and music to technical, stage management and production. They aim to provide training through workshops and short courses. Involvement in the company activities is free. They received a grant for £2,000. This year they are staging productions of Mack and Mabel and Last Easter, together with a performance with Jigsaw Theatre Company.

Queens Park Arts Centre staged their 2nd Pottery Festival which took place in April and May. There were talks by well-known potters, exhibitions, demonstrations, competitions and children's workshops. £2,000 was granted.

Ryder Cheshire Volunteers received a grant of £2,000 to help fund volunteer recruitment and training. Ryder Cheshire Volunteers provide opportunities for people with physical disabilities to take up leisure, sporting and educational activities which may be based in their own homes. These include computer skills, art, swimming, knitting, ten pin bowling and many more activities. They arrange coach outings to places such as the London Eye or Kew Gardens and regularly meet up for pub lunches.

Blues and Twos Community Tag Rugby is a sports initiative created by two PCSOs covering the Elm Farm and Mandeville areas. They received £2,000 to stage a Tag Rugby Festival and buy equipment. The first event of Tag Rugby held in July 2008 attracted 38 young people from the age of 5 to 16 years old who were split into different age groups. Parents of the children and residents were able to actively get involved and some sessions had up to 80 people playing.

Shakti Women's Group were awarded £300 to take members on a theatre trip. The group promote multicultural activities and are working towards raising the profile of women who do not have a voice of their own. They are affiliated to the Indian Cultural Society. The group meet monthly and it's an opportunity for ladies to socialize, develop new hobbies and develop organisational skills. They have a membership of 50 ladies and raise money for charity through the production of their own cookery book.

Bucks Association for the Blind and Partially Sighted People received £750 towards funding their annual DeFraine Competition. Members of the association submitted arts and crafts at this special day and trophies were presented. The Aylesbury Methodist Church have recently had new and improvement work carried out. They received £800 towards new furniture for the entrance hall. The building is not only used for church activities but is also hired out to many community groups.

Bucks CC Football Club (under 12 colts) are to visit Aylesbury's twin town of Bourg-en-Bresse in the summer for 4 days and play three football matches. They received £2,000 towards travel and accommodation costs.

Future Inspirations are starting up coffee mornings fortnightly and requested funding for equipment and new toys. These will be used as a tool to support women with personal, isolation and health issues. Aylesbury Town Council granted them £1,000.

Neighbourhood Police Team received a grant of £589 to purchase three bicycles for PCSOs in the Central Ward. The area covered is quite extensive and it will be really useful for them to be able to travel more quickly, especially when following suspects.

The New Roxette received a further £1,000 towards the cost of producing their newsletter which highlights the music scene around Aylesbury.
