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Increase in our Floral Displays... possibly

This year most councils will be more stretched for money than ever before due to the economic downturn. The determination of most councils not to increase council tax this year while absorbing the projected 3 - 4% increases in overall costs puts further pressure on existing services.

Aylesbury Town Council wants to continue to improve the look of the town and not just the town centre. Working with Bucks County Council over the last two years many areas have been cleared of vegetation and trees pollarded that had not been touched for a considerable time. However in this economic climate the Town Council cannot promise to put in place further improvements unless we can identify economies elsewhere.

Our plans for Aylesbury Town this year include:

- Planting more daffodil bulbs in verges alongside the main roads into the town
- Planting more daffodil bulbs in appropriate places in other areas of the town
- Carrying out a small project in the Haydon Hill area
- A clearance and replanting of an area in Southcourt
- Improving the floral displays situated on the 'Welcome to Aylesbury' signs
- Replacing the perennials and shrubs in flower beds around the Hub (inner relief road) killed off by two hard winters
- Tree planting.

Celebrity interview... Lynda Bellingham

Most of us remember her as the Oxo mum, preparing wholesome meals for middle England's stereotypical nuclear family. But, with stints on Doctor Who playing a Time Lady, The Bill as an arch villain and headlining the recent Calendar Girls tour, Lynda Bellingham has a rich and diverse acting career. That's not forgetting of course her candid Loose Women contributions. Did we mention she also used to live in Aylesbury? After slipping behind the limelight at the Waterside Theatre between performances, Aylesbury Town Council had a quick chat with the town's leading actress.

Born in Canada, but adopted as a young baby, she was brought up in Britain. Her family settled on a farm in Aston Abbots where her connection with Aylesbury was to develop during her formative years. Although they weren't local to the area, Lynda remembers her family making every effort to integrate into the community. 'When Wing airport was threatened, as a former pilot my father had an authoritative knowledge of planes, noise, and pollution which the village relied on,' she recalled, 'he became a stalwart of our village.'


While a pupil at Aylesbury High School, she earned herself pocket-money working at the Odeon on Cambridge Street. Selling ice cream to cinema audiences, she had to battle hoards of children clamouring to steal nuts off the top of Cornettos, some of whom were sadly successful. This cinema, which used to be an old theatre hall, has long since closed. This is just one of many changes to the town Lynda remembers. The Regent Café, now Desire, in Kingsbury is another example, 'I worked out that I spent two and a half thousand hours of my life in the Regent Café – a real 60s place' she says with understated certainty.

She remembers the sights and sounds of her youth in the town fondly, reciting tales of evenings spent socialising in the Dark Lantern which had a reputation for quenching the thirst of Aylesbury's more colourful characters. But, like the Odeon, things have long since changed.

Remembering old friends she used to bump into on a daily basis in Aylesbury, and observing the distinct changes that have happened, Lynda feels that over the years there has been a decline in communities, nationally as well as locally. 'While I've been on tour, I've seen a range of towns across the country. Only a few have managed to maintain the concept of community,' she explains, adding 'I know it's hard in this day and age, but it needn't have been like that.' Lynda was pleased to learn of Aylesbury Town Council's events programme, which aims to get people into the town enjoying themselves together in order to foster community spirit.

But communities can be based around issues, not just locations, and charity work has been a strong component of Lynda's off screen work for some time. 'It started twenty five years ago with Barnardo's,' she said, going on to explain how she went to find her birth mother when she was pregnant and doctors were asking about the possibility of inherited conditions. 'Barnardo's has changed a lot,' she explains. 'Everyone thinks of children's homes, but they deal with a wide range of issues affecting children including exploitation – it's frightening really,' she commented after describing a recent visit to a Barnardo's sponsored shelter.

Her other supported charity is the Alzheimer's Society, which helps older people who are suffering the effect of dementia. Sadly, this is a condition Lynda has seen up close after it was diagnosed in her mother. This work ties into a much broader philosophy about old age which she feels, prompted by the recession, needs a rethink. 'We did burning our bras, we did the pill; we are now the first post revolution generation facing old age, and for many this is a very frightening time.' She believes that older people are undervalued; they



can still lead rich lives contributing to society and the economy. Referring to her recent stage performances, 'I'm terribly sad when women come to me after the show and tell me "I'm just waiting to die".'

At least though, the message contained within Calendar Girls is one of inspiration, 'If you imagine those ladies from Yorkshire, the brave original Calendar Girls who took a leap of faith – it was a huge thing and people were aghast at first! That the concept was so accepted is a warming fact, especially since none of them were under 40.' Their deeds have now raised an impressive £3 million for leukaemia research.

"It's just got a lot of heart - Tim Firth who wrote Calendar Girls managed the perfect balance between laughing and crying, he's run through the gamut of emotions."

For Aylesbury's new Waterside Theatre, Lynda has been a big seller, with virtually every show completely selling out. The capacity audience, filling row after row, testify to Lynda's star performances, the heart of the Calendar Girls story and of course the draw of the Waterside. 'Oh, it's beautiful,' Lynda replies, when asked her opinion on Aylesbury's new theatre, 'I know some are divided, but I think the architect has done a fantastic job. Parking is a bit of an issue though.'

Aylesbury Town Council would like to thank Lynda for taking time from her busy schedule of performances to chat with us. We can't wait to see her next star performance!

Local lad, Sam Ridgeway, who has been a previous recipient of an Aylesbury Town Council grant, has broken his second world record throwing the hammer.

At an exciting event in the Northwood Stadium in Stoke-on-Trent on the 20th November 2010, Sam was entered in the Under 19 Male Hammer Pentathlon having broken the World Record for the Under 17 event last year.

A nervous first round with the 3kg hammer began with two no throws so Sam was forced to put out a 'safe' third attempt to ensure his continuation in the competition. It was still a considerable throw however at over 63 metres.

His longest throw of the day followed in round two with 65.39 metres in the 4kg hammer event and he continued with 61 metres with the 5kg and 53 metres in the 6kg competition. Still requiring a good throw in the fifth round Sam threw the 7.25kg hammer out 49.84 metres just 17cm short of his personal best with the men's weight.

So with a combined total distance from the five events of 294.82 metres, the record, which had been set by an athlete in Ireland in 2006, was broken and Sam now has his second World Record!



Aylesbury Town Council is the council closest to the residents in the parish of Aylesbury. The Town Council is here to be a voice for the residents by representing their views on issues affecting them. Aylesbury Town Council maintains responsibility for the management of the seven local allotment sites, the Tring Road Cemetery and the Office of the Mayor. The Town Council supports the local economy by putting on a programme of events throughout the year to encourage community participation and for the entertainment of residents and visitors.

Aylesbury Vale District Council deal with issues covering the whole of Aylesbury Vale and has a very regulatory remit. Aylesbury Vale District Council is responsible for the collection of the Council Tax and Business Rates as well as household waste disposal, local planning and building regulations and public car parks. Aylesbury Vale District Council deal with licensing (public houses, taxis and so on) and inspect and regulate commercial food premises.

Aylesbury Emergency Planning

Aylesbury Town Council represents a population of nearly 60,000 who are housed in upwards of 24,000 homes within the civil parish. We live in a major population centre which is the focal point for commerce and industry in the Vale area. These are no small facts and, should the worst happen, we need to know what we as a local government body, and together as a community, can do to help.

In modern Britain we are privileged enough to have standing, professional emergency services who will respond in a crisis. Emergency planning isn't intended to offer a replacement for these professionals. However, there could be situations in which they are stretched beyond capacity or otherwise engaged.

"Emergency planning aims to provide a contingency for an emergency situation in the parish of Aylesbury where there is a delayed, interrupted or unavailable response from the established emergency services."

Nobody likes thinking about the idea of a major emergency in Aylesbury. However, Aylesbury Town Council is taking steps to ensure that if it does happen we know what to do for the best. We are in the process of emergency planning to produce sensible courses of action should the worst happen. This is as a result of the Civil Contingencies Act 2004 which places a responsibility on all local authorities to plan responses to an emergency situation.



While we're thinking hard about what we can do, we also need to know what you can do. In an emergency, we all need to work together, especially in a situation where the established professional emergency services are delayed or unavailable. Do you have a particular skill or resource which would be of use? Are you a trained first aider? Have you had experience planning and responding to emergencies?

Along with our planning procedures, we are forming community response teams to help in an emergency. If you think you can help in any way, do not hesitate to contact Aylesbury Town Council and we can discuss the matter further. Volunteering could help save lives.

Preparing For Emergencies at Home

Right now you can help yourself react in a sensible manner in an emergency. The steps below offer some guidance to help you plan at home, keeping calm and organised should there be an emergency.

- Read the Government advice.
 Go to www.direct.gov.uk and search for 'Dealing with emergencies'
- Keep a list of important emergency contacts, such as relatives and the doctor, in a safe place at home
- Make an emergency box containing practical items like a first aid kit, torch, radio, spare batteries, pens, paper, and medicines

- Find out how to turn off the gas, water and electricity at home
- Find out what procedures are in place at work and at your child's school

- Once you've planned for emergencies at home, talk to all your family to make sure they know too.

Aylesbury Town Council - In the Red with Diesel

In times of economic uncertainty, every penny counts. Everyone wants to stay in the black, not the red – everyone except Aylesbury Town Council. However, this is one situation where being in the red is a shrewd cost saving move, not an expense; we've made the switch to red diesel!

In the UK all fuel sold attracts duty – a tax paid to central government. Everyone notices the effect of fuel duty following the annual budget when changes are reflected in fluctuating pump prices. However, fuel duty is not universal and different types of fuel attract different levels of duty depending on their future use.

Red diesel is intended primarily for off-road agricultural or construction uses and as such attracts a much lower duty. It's just like regular diesel you get from the pump, except a chemical solvent dye is added into the fuel to distinguish it from its higher duty counterpart.

How To Make Red Diesel

- Plants and animals, which died millions of years ago, are subjected to intense pressure and heat underground turning their remains into crude oil.
- Also known as petroleum, crude oil is extracted from the earth using oil rigs and pumping wells before being barrelled up and transported around the world to refineries using massive oil tankers and long pipelines.
- The refineries then fractionally distil the crude oil under incredibly high temperature and pressure. Lighter fractions of the distilled crude oil boil off first, with heavier fractions taking longer. Petrol evaporates at around 150°C while diesel requires temperatures around 300°C. Heavier fractions are often chemically cracked into other useful products such as paraffin wax and lubricating oils.
- A red solvent dye is added as a chemical marker to the red diesel allowing the government to distinguish it from regular white diesel and attach appropriate fuel duties.
- The red diesel is transported to various distributors across the world who then sell it on to consumers like Aylesbury Town Council, putting it to use in their equipment and machinery.

In January 2011, Aylesbury Town Council swapped expensive white diesel, for economic red diesel. With over half of our vehicle fleet eligible to fill up on red, it makes sound fiscal sense. The annual fuel bill has been cut almost in half saving us hundreds of pounds.



Robert Taft, Outdoor Supervisor for Aylesbury Town Council, was very pleased with the change, 'Coming from an agricultural background, I knew using the red diesel in our fleet was the right thing to do,' he commented, concluding, 'the final results will be very positive for the people of Aylesbury.'

Aylesbury Town Council's Project Officer, Daniel Parslow, who led the research, was in agreement, adding, 'This is one step in a much larger energy procurement plan. With increasing uncertainty in the fuel market anything we can do to cut costs and promote stability for us is a sound move. Our next stage will be bio-diesel, and we're very excited.'

Bio-Diesel

Using a relatively simple chemical process controlled by specialised equipment, used cooking oil can be transformed into fuel usable in diesel engines. Self produced bio-diesel is clean, green and cheaper than diesel from the pump. It forms the next step in Aylesbury Town Council's energy management plans. This is where we need your help. 

Introducing The Greys

As you can see Aylesbury Town Matters now has a comic strip called "The Greys", created by two longterm local residents, Mark Crutch and Vince Mealing. This comic began life way back in 1994 as a means to learn more about creating art using a computer. It ran to about a dozen finished strips, but wasn't released to the public.

In November 2008 The Greys was resurrected as a webcomic. A few months was spent updating some of the older strips, and drawing some new ones. Finally in May 2009 the webcomic went live, with a new strip posted at least every fortnight since then.

The online comics are sci-fi themed, but with a mixture of jokes to appeal to all tastes. For the strips in Town Matters, however, Mark and Vince are specifically aiming their jokes at some of the sights and sounds that will be familiar to Aylesbury residents. "Because our main characters are aliens", explains Mark, "we can use them to look at



our everyday surroundings with an unfamiliar eye. The Greys can have a different outlook on commonplace things that we otherwise take for granted."

There's more to The Greys than most comic strips, however. The drawings are released under a "Creative Commons" license, which allows them to be freely used, copied, translated and modified for personal use. "We don't just produce a printed picture," said Vince, "we also share the file that was used to create that picture. Anyone can visit our website and download the original artwork files for our comics."

"We're keen for people experiment with their to computers," Mark continued. "Too many people spend a small fortune on a machine, then just use it for Facebook and email. A computer – even a cheap or old one – can be a wonderful creative tool. If people can download our comics, pick them apart and learn from them, perhaps some of those people might go on to create comics or other drawings of their own."

In support of this egalitarian approach to computing, The Greys is created using an "Open Source" graphics program called "Inkscape" which can be downloaded free of charge from www.inkscape.org
