There were large crowds in Kingsbury and Market Square all day, and thousands filled the square in the early evening for headliners The Searchers, joining in enthusiastically with every classic hit delivered. Just a week later the venue switched to a gloriously sunny Vale Park, with three top quality locally-based bands entertaining throughout the afternoon. Not forgetting the Saturday night when Proms in the Park played to its biggest ever audience, a different style of music but enjoyed just as much by a crowd of all ages, with just as much singing along! The Council has once again received high praise from members of the public for its floral displays, extended this year into some parts of town not previously decorated. Once again the Britain in Bloom judges were impressed with our efforts, and equally so with the work done by many community groups who've taken pride in their local areas and made wonderful efforts to tidy them up and bring beauty to former "grot spots".

The entire Council, and the Town, were shocked and deeply saddened by the sudden death of our Mayor Cllr Steve Patrick, in August. Steve served on the Town Council since 2001, and as Leader, Deputy Mayor and Mayor was the driving force of many of our achievements. He was hugely respected on all sides of local politics, and a dear friend as well as colleague to me.

We elected our new Mayor Cllr Tom Hunter-Watts, in September. Tom has made a great start to his term, approaching his duties with energy and enthusiasm, and proving to be a powerful advocate for our Town and all the great things that go on here. You can find out more about Tom on page 16.

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
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Christmas Fair & Carolfest

Allotment Competition 2013



The annual Aylesbury Town Council (ATC) Allotments Awards were held at the beginning of October.

The judges were willingly recruited, and we are grateful to Steve Webb (Outdoor Manager), Alderman Ray James (Allotment Warden – Crown Leys), Mrs Wendy Curtis and Joe Benham for two busy days of assessment at all of our allotment sites.

The criteria for judging extended beyond simply considering the general appearance of a plot. They included the desirability for varied planting (a mixture of vegetables, fruits and flowers) and also considered factors such as composting and cleanliness.

A very slow start to the season ended up being a hugely successful year for gardening and growing. All three judges expressed their surprise at the quality and excellent condition of many allotment gardens, and sympathised with those who had abandoned their attempts to feed the family this year. There is no doubt that in difficult weather conditions a gardener needs even more time than usual to make it work.

The judges awarded prizes to the best three plots at each site, with additional prizes for Best Newcomer and Overall Winner. The presentations were given by Mayor Cllr Tom Hunter-Watts. The 1st Prize winners received an engraved shield, and all those awarded received a certificate and vouchers kindly donated by the Aylesbury Gardening Society.

Thames & Chilterns in Bloom Awards

Aylesbury has been awarded a Silver Gilt for this year's entry in The Thames and Chilterns in Bloom Regional Awards. Aylesbury Town Clerk Keith Gray, Volunteer Wendy Curtis and Cllr Allison Harrison accepted the Award at a presentations ceremony in Reading on Wednesday 18 September. The event was hosted by the Mayor of Reading, Councillor Marion Livingston, and attended by Mayors and other dignitaries from across the Thames and Chilterns region, Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire.

The annual Britain in Bloom campaign is the largest horticultural event in Europe and attracts nearly 2,000 entries from cities, towns and villages across Britain. The main aim of the campaign is to encourage and celebrate local communities improving their local environments. Over twenty-five cities, towns, urban communities and villages entered the regional Thames and Chilterns campaign. This year there were also fifteen entries for the RHS It's Your Neighbourhood category.

Thames and Chilterns in Bloom judges visited all the entrants throughout July, looking for all-round horticultural achievement including conservation and natural areas; they assessed yearround activities which improve the environment and full community involvement and participation. Aylesbury was particularly noticed for the floral displays throughout the town, from hanging baskets to troughs and containers, as well as our dedication to conservation and biodiversity and the ongoing projects we have created with town residents and volunteers.

Ted Smith, Chairman of Thames and Chilterns in Bloom said "We were delighted by the very high standard across the region, the commitment by all entrants is tremendous and I would like to thank all local Bloom committees for their continued support of the Campaign."

Aylesbury Town Chaplaincy

The Aylesbury Town Chaplaincy is an initiative by the local Christian community to help serve their needs. It has been formed as an independent charitable trust and has volunteers serving as trustees, chaplains and street angels drawn from across the town's churches.

During the night-time, Street Angels provide voluntary support and help make the town centre safe and enjoyable for everyone. Since November 2012 a team has been out each weekend engaging with the public.

They can offer a listening ear to help those who are isolated or separated from friends, and on a practical level they give out space blankets on cold nights, flat shoes or wait with someone for a taxi or a lift.

During the day, volunteer chaplains are out and about in the town centre to be a friendly presence for shoppers and others visiting or working in Aylesbury.

A grant of £920 has been awarded to enable Street Angels to provide more practical support to people by funding some of the consumables they give away.





Aylesbury Ghausia Mosque

Established in the late 1980s, Aylesbury Ghausia Mosque is the only purpose built Mosque in Aylesbury Vale. The Mosque hosted a very successful Open Day on 26 August 2013, with many positive comments from the broad spectrum of people that attended.

Thanks go to Aylesbury Town Council who awarded the Mosque a grant of £300, which along with other funding, facilitated the Mosque putting on a high quality professional exhibition as part of the Open Day.

Iftekhar Bashir, President of Aylesbury Ghausia Mosque said: "We hope to make this an annual community event and look forward to the positive impact on our community."




Soroptimist Club

Preparing for Retail Lift Off

Retail Lift Off was an initiative launched by Aylesbury Town Centre Partnership to provide new, local independent traders and entrepreneurs an opportunity to trade and have free business support in the town centre. The initiative was not to install "pop up" businesses but to create sustainable opportunities for new businesses.



Retail Lift Off attracted 35 strong applications of interest from talented people. And, after a rigorous selection process, 5 new local entrepreneurs accepted the offer to kickstart their businesses in the town centre.

These successful entrepreneurs were given six weeks rentfree trading on a market stall, a bespoke retail barrow, shopping centre mall space or an empty shop unit. This was followed by a further six weeks of subsidised rent.

The initiative also provided a network of free support ranging from business and financial advice to marketing and retail advice. Each successful business was provided with a "buddy" – an experienced business person who helped them through the selection process as a mentor and guide. The buddy continues to support them as a helping hand through their business venture.

Diana Fawcett, Town Centre Manager said: "We know the retail environment can be tough, particularly for independents. Retail Lift Off is supporting ambitious independents where it matters. We are delighted with the calibre of new traders and their offers will add more choice for our shoppers."

Keith Gray (Town Clerk) "The Town Council is a committed partner of the Town Centre Partnership and has donated a substantial grant towards the Retail Lift Off initiative. It's important that support is given to local businesses to ensure a vibrant town centre."

Three of the businesses have already started trading in town: **BeCo Chic Accessories** are two sisters from Aylesbury trading from a portable retail barrow in the Hale Leys Shopping Centre every Wednesday and Friday, offering a variety of affordable fashion items including handbags, scarves and jewellery. The sisters say they are "delighted with how trade is going at the moment. We didn't expect to be so busy and footfall is much higher than anticipated. Taking part in the Retail Lift Off initiative has given us the tools to improve our chance of business success."

Annie's Kitchen Preserves sells homemade jams, jellies, marmalades and chutney at Aylesbury market every Saturday.

Malcolm's Rock of the Raven is also on the market. This Leighton Buzzard artist is selling his unique "shabby chic" upcycled furniture on Wednesdays and Fridays, but long term is looking to move into an empty shop unit.

Andrew Dean's Pogo is set to open in November. It will be the only dedicated children's clothing and accessories shop in the town. All stock will be made or sourced locally.

And finally Princes Risborough resident Michelle Young will be setting up her **Coolberry Café** next year. She'll be selling frozen yoghurts, waffles, milkshakes and smoothies from a mobile unit.

All of the new businesses said that they really benefitted from the Retail Lift Off process, and the training and support from business buddies gave them the confidence and knowledge to move forward with their businesses.

Contact the Elderly is the only national charity solely dedicated to tackling loneliness and social isolation among older people.

They organise monthly Sunday afternoon tea parties for small groups of older people (aged 75+) who live alone, and volunteers within their local community, offering a regular and vital friendship link every month.

Each older person is collected from their home by a volunteer driver and taken to a volunteer host's home for the afternoon. The group is warmly welcomed by a different host each month, but the drivers remain the same which means that over the months and years, acquaintances turn into friends and loneliness is replaced by companionship.

The tea parties are a real lifeline of friendship for the older members who have little or no contact with any family or friends. They bring people of all ages together, develop fulfilling friendships and support networks, and give everyone involved something to look forward to each month.

Crime Free Christmas



Over the excitement of the festive season it's all too easy to forget about security and personal safety. Here are the Community Safety Partnership's top tips to help keep your Christmas crime free and happy.

Christmas Shopping

- Make sure you park in a well lit area or in an attended car park.
- When Christmas shopping, be aware of how much you are carrying with you. iPods, digital cameras, mobile phones, and extra cash to buy presents means you could be the ideal target for thieves.
- Keep your bag zipped up and facing you. Don't make it easy for pickpockets.

Vehicle Security

- Don't leave presents on the back seat of your vehicle. Don't tempt thieves, put items out of sight and in the boot.
- Never leave your keys in the ignition whilst your vehicle is unattended, even for a few minutes.
 Opportunist thieves will often steal cars that have been left with the engine running to defrost the windows.

Security of the Home

- Use a timer switch to make your home appear occupied when you are out. Plugging it into a lamp on the upstairs landing ensures your home is not left in darkness.
- Don't encourage thieves to window shop at your home. Keep Christmas gifts and valuables out of sight of windows and doors. Avoid putting presents under the tree until Christmas morning.
- If your front and back doors are not secure, neither is your home. Most burglars gain entry through a door.
- Make sure you security mark your Christmas presents before you wrap them. You can either postcode mark your property with an ultra violet pen, or use a forensic marking solution such as Smartwater. Make a note of all model/serial numbers of electronic goods.
- If you are going on holiday over the festive period, ask a friend or neighbour to keep an eye on your house.
- Dispose of present boxes discretely. Don't make it obvious you've just bought a new 3D television.

The Christmas Party

- Alternate alcoholic drinks with soft drinks or water, and use mixers to dilute your drinks.
- Don't accept drinks from strangers and never leave your drink unattended.
- Don't carry large amounts of cash on you when you go out. Be alert, stick with friends and make sure your purse or wallet is secure and away from view.
- Plan your night before you go out. Think about how you are going to get home; it isn't worth the devastating consequences of drink driving. Ask a family member or friend to pick you up, or pre-book a licensed taxi.

Important Information for Windows XP Users

At the start of April 2014 Windows XP will no longer be supported by Microsoft and will no longer receive security updates. This isn't something that would usually make it to the pages of Aylesbury Town Matters, but due to XP's prolonged availability and the low uptake of its successor, Windows Vista, it is estimated that nearly a third of PCs are still running this ageing operating system, making it a potential problem for a lot of readers.

Many security experts believe that criminal groups are now starting to stockpile security exploits in preparation for next April. In theory, any bug or exploit revealed after then will not be fixed by Microsoft, making viruses and other malware more dangerous than ever. If you're still running Windows XP you should begin to make contingency plans now:

1) Back-up of all your important data. This goes for every computer user, regardless of their operating system. Ideally you should make multiple backups, and update them regularly. If you can, you should also keep some backups in a different location – perhaps you could partner with a friend or relative to store each other's files. There are also many cloud-based backup services available, but you should always ensure you have a local backup as well.

2) If you can, you should replace your Windows XP system. Many machines that run XP will not be powerful enough to practically run Windows 8, so you may need to consider buying a new machine.

3) If you can't afford to replace your hardware, you could replace XP with something suitable for older machines, such as Lubuntu (www.lubuntu.net) or Xubuntu (www.xubuntu.org). These don't run Windows applications, but do come with dozens of programs and have hundreds more available to download, almost all of them free of charge. If you're not technically minded, however, you should probably get help from someone else if you decide to take this approach.

4) If you continue using Windows XP it is more important than ever to ensure that your anti-virus software is kept up to date. Despite what Hollywood suggests, most viruses don't advertise their presence with a skull and crossbones. Instead they sit silently in the background, recording your keystrokes, or using your PC as part of a swarm of compromised machines in a coordinated attack.

5) Stop using Internet Explorer. Microsoft no longer produce new versions of IE that will work on Windows XP, so it's stuck with IE8 which is already woefully out of date. Install a newer web browser, such as Firefox (www.firefox.com) or Google Chrome (www.google.com/chrome)

6) Back-up your data. Really.





Aylesbury Town Twinning

Aylesbury Town Clerk, Keith Gray has recently been appointed as the new Chairman of the Aylesbury Twinning Association. Town twinning is all about bringing people together. It creates opportunities for citizens of member towns to experience and explore other cultures. It nurtures an atmosphere for economic development and trade opportunities and breaks down cultural and social barriers.

Aylesbury is twinned with the French town of Bourg-en-Bresse; a delightful town, easily reached by train, car or air. It is almost mid-way between Geneva and Lyon and is at the southern end of the wine route of Alsace. Many hundreds of Aylesbury children, cyclists and others have visited the colourful capital of the department of Ain, receiving a welcome that has to be experienced to be believed.

Bourg-en-Bresse is a centre of industry and research. The area boasts a huge Renault factory and also specialises in ceramics – including jewellery. The manufactures consist of iron goods, mineral waters, tallow, soap and earthenware. There are flour mills and breweries, and there is considerable trade in grain, cattle and poultry.


Bourg-en-Bresse even have their own equivalent to our famous Aylesbury Duck... The Poulet de Bresse is the only chicken in the world


to be protected, like a famous wine, by an Apellation d'Origine Controlée (AOC). It is said that, as a result of that tradition, it has the tastiest, firmest and most succulent flesh of any chicken anywhere.

In 1825, one of the world's first and greatest foodies, the 19th-century epicure and gastronome Jean Anthelme Brillat-Savarin, described the bird as "the queen of chickens, and the chicken of kings".

Growing Bonds

In 2013, our twin ties with Bourg-en-Bresse grew even stronger with the partnership of Turnfurlong Junior School and Notre Dame School. The schools started exchanging videos and greetings before enthusiastically developing further links. On 12 June, forty French children from





Notre Dame School, accompanied by their teachers, were welcomed to Turnfurlong School for the day. They also had the opportunity of meeting the late Cllr Steve Patrick, who welcomed them to the Town Hall.

Year 6 pupils from Aylesbury visited Bourg-en-Bresse later that month, and there will be more opportunities for the children to go to France in 2014.

The Lycée Lalande High School is also interested in organising an exchange with groups of pupils in years 11 to 13.

The Future

In 2014, the Twinning Association will continue to celebrate and encourage international links, helping to improve both the harmony of the Town and its future development.

The committee is keen to raise the profile of Aylesbury and would welcome any ideas and support. Developing these links offers numerous unique opportunities to understand the valuable history of the communities that make up Aylesbury's population.





Great Recipe to Try!

Poulet de Bresse a la Crème

Just as wines are linked to government-sanctioned regions, so is a special chicken. Alain Ducasse (Le Relais Plaza, Paris) and Guy Savoy (Restaurant Guy Savoy, Paris) are among the chefs who swear by the white-feathered, blue-footed bird that roams freely and is fed a diet of corn and spring water.

Only five percent of poulet de bresse are exported. At Hostellerie Chateau de la Barge (near Macon, France), hotel chefs instruct in how to prepare poulet de bresse. Proper preparation involves retaining most of the bird's water and fat. Here's their savoury recipe:

Makes four servings:

1 poulet de bresse (or other chicken) 🛹 4 cups crème fraiche 1 cup dry white wine 1/4 cup butter Ground salt and pepper

Clean chicken and cut into eight pieces. Heat butter in casserole dish and cook the chicken in the butter. When the pieces are stiffened, and a golden-brown colour, pour the white wine over and cook until the wine is almost gone.

Cook chicken with the crème fraiche over low heat for about 35 minutes. Remove the chicken pieces. Reduce the cooking until there are only two cups of liquid. Glaze the chicken with the sauce and serve.


