From music to markets and festivals to fairs, you can be sure that there's always something interesting happening in Aylesbury.

Throughout the year the Town Council works closely with Aylesbury Town Centre Partnership and Aylesbury Vale District Council to provide entertainment for residents and visitors alike. On Sunday 15th June we begin the summer's programme of events with a free day of **Father's Day Fun** in Aylesbury's Market Square. The whole family can enjoy a day packed with fantastic activities – from sports and fun inflatables, to face painting and balloon modelling.

The **Roald Dahl Festival** is a fantastic way to showcase artistic talent and celebrate the international writer in a vibrant and colourful parade that's held each year.

The following day, Sunday 6th July, the joy of the seaside comes to Kingsbury with Aylesbury on Sea. One of Aylesbury Town Council's biggest and best town centre events, the day will be packed full of activities and games, including bouncy castles, donkey rides, balloon modelling, face painting and pirates! Fun for the whole family.

Summer in Aylesbury just wouldn't be summer without live music in the town centre. Hobble on the Cobbles returns on Sunday 24th August. Buckinghamshire's largest free all-day music festival showcases some of the very best local talent, including a very special headline act. Hobble caters for a wide range of musical styles and genres to suit all tastes, from heavy rock to hip-hop to acoustic pop.

Bring your friends, family and a picnic for a flag-waving finale to the summer. **Proms in the Park**, on Saturday 30th August, is Aylesbury Town Council's answer to The Last Night of the Proms. You'll be in great company for the event, which gets bigger and better each year. Sit back and relax and enjoy stellar performances from the Aylesbury Concert Band and our wonderful soloists.

Drawing the summer to a close, Aylesbury Town Council host an evening of **live music in Vale Park** on Sunday 31st August. Three fantastic local bands take to the main stage, including The Dung Beatles and Bustin' Loose, who return for the second year running. The final weekend of August also brings us **Parklife**, a weekend programme of entertainment in Vale Park for all the family including sports, music, arts and crafts. Various activities and entertainment are brought to you by Aylesbury Church Network, Aylesbury Town Centre Partnership and Aylesbury Town Council.

#### And that's not all...

#### **Britain** in Bloom

Every year Aylesbury enters into the Royal Horticultural Society – Britain in Bloom competition, and this year is no different.

During the last few years Aylesbury has achieved great results by winning Silver and Silver Gilt awards. But now is the time to go for 'Gold'.

Many people think that Britain in Bloom is just about flowers and floral displays, and are surprised to hear that it's also about community involvement and environmental responsibility. 'In Bloom' communities tackle everything from litter and graffiti, conservation and recycling, through to dealing with social exclusion, anti-social behaviour and improving pride of place.

There are lots of ways that residents can get involved, either as individuals or as part of a school, business, social, family or community group. Activities include weeding, litter picks, graffiti removal, pruning, planting green areas and communal gardens.

You can also help our local campaign by keeping your house and business frontage clean and tidy, swept and free of litter and weeds. The cleanliness of the street scene is vital to the visual impact of the town, and the Britain in Bloom judges will be looking at that during their tour of Aylesbury in July. We are up against some strong competition from other small cities in the region but together as One Community we can achieve our goal and win Gold.

#### How does Britain in Bloom work?

It is an all year round campaign and not just for the spring to summer period. Our local campaign stands under the 'Aylesbury in Bloom' umbrella, illustrated by a new logo.

With our campaign we enter the regional RHS Chiltern & Thames Valley in Bloom competition and have judges coming to see projects and areas in the Parish of Aylesbury. They will be looking at projects undertaken by local schools, residents, volunteer groups, as well as the overall street picture and open spaces.

Based on their tour of Aylesbury and a presentation they will then decide which award we will receive. We will find out the result in September. The regional judges can then nominate towns, cities and villages in their region to go forward to the National Britain in Bloom competition to represent the region.

Aylesbury Town Council is working in partnership with Aylesbury Town Centre Management, Aylesbury Vale District Council, Buckinghamshire County Council and Bucks Legacy to achieve a Gold medal. Not only will our town look lovely but winning Gold also has some great benefits in attracting more visitors to the town, which will benefit the local economy.

### 'Growing for Gold and Remembering' is our motto for this year's Aylesbury in Bloom campaign.

Plans are already in place to commemorate the anniversary of the First World War in our floral displays and to conserve wildlife by growing pollinator plants for bees, butterflies and other pollinating insects. Look out for the stunning displays which will be planted in June on some of our roundabouts and grass areas in and around the town centre.

#### What has happened so far?

This year's campaign kicked off on April 16th and May 10th, where you may have seen us in Aylesbury's Market Square. We told visitors, residents and shoppers more about our local garden competition and the overall Aylesbury in Bloom campaign and showed them what projects were completed last year. This year we are looking for as many entries as possible in the local garden competition which offers a category for everyone, so please take the time to enter by completing our entry form on the opposite page.

Once again we are working with Mr Bumble and are creating bumblebee sanctuaries throughout Aylesbury. You may have noticed the green area by the subway on Anchor Lane, which students from Harding House School planted with wildflowers and pollinator plants to attract more bees, butterflies and pollinating insects. This is just one of many areas around our town where local groups have planted and greened areas during the last year, and we will report back on even more projects in forthcoming magazines.

Aylesbury in Bloom is not just a summer campaign but an all year round campaign, so if you are already part of a group that arranges litter picks, clean ups, planting etc. please do get in touch, as we want to show your great work and achievements to the judges who will be arriving in July.

The RHS has also created a scheme called 'It's Your Neighbourhood' and this year we have our first entry from Aylesbury...

Last autumn we told you about Bearbrook Place, where the residents started a community garden. Bearbrook Place has entered in the It's Your Neighbourhood competition and we wish them all the very best and good luck. We can't wait to report back on their achievement.

It only takes one or two willing and energetic individuals to start a project and to contribute with their engagement to the wider community.

We all have one common goal which is to make Aylesbury a greener and better place to live, where residents, businesses and community groups take responsibility for their environment, surroundings and one another!

### Aylesbury Open Gardens

Sunday 29th June 2014 2.00pm - 6.00pm

Four mature town gardens will be opening this year in Aylesbury under the National Gardens Scheme. Each garden displays the individuality of its owner and their passions.

#### 2 Spenser Road

Tranquil cottage style garden with many ornamental trees raised from seed. Victorian greenhouse with original features containing a collection of pelargoniums and tender plants. Vegetable garden featuring raised beds. Homemade teas and plants for sale.

#### 16 Milton Road

Mature town garden featuring oriental and Mediterranean patios and pergolas with grape vines and clematis, woodland fernery and wildlife pond. Numerous hanging baskets and tubs add colour and a display of hostas add rich foliage.

#### 7 Wendover Way

Modern cottage garden substantially landscaped in 2010 and is designed for year round interest. A wide variety of shrubs and perennials. Water feature, pergola, ornaments and summerhouse.

#### 185 Tring Road

1930s 140ft cottage-style garden completely redesigned in 2007 and tweaked constantly since. Large koi pond and wildlife pond, various beds, shrubs, rose bed, pergolas and patios, lawned area with many seating points and various specimen exotics. Front garden is hedged with a wisteria climbing the front wall. Wheelchair access.

Combined entrance fee is £4, children free. All proceeds go to various national charities including MacMillan Cancer Support, Help the Hospices, Carers Trust, Marie Curie Cancer Care and five other national charities.



Last year ≠138,800 was raised in Berks \$ Bucks for charity through open gardens.

### Aylesbury Gardening Society

Aylesbury Gardening Society was established in 1880, but until 1965 was known as the Aylesbury Borough Allotment and Gardens Protection Society. But, even before this, in the 1920s and 30s there was the Aylesbury Floral and Horticultural Society.

However, this was a different Society from the one we know today. This organisation arranged several 'special' shows in a year. For example in April 1829, the show was for Auriculas, Polyanthuses, Cucumbers and Apples, and in May it was Tulips and Anemones.

There were further shows in June and August, finishing in October with an 'Apple' Show. The shows were accompanied by a dinner, speeches and usually singing. As might be guessed, these were shows for the local gentry and the exhibits most probably prepared by paid gardeners.

Much more could be written about this Society but, to the present time, the Aylesbury Gardening Society is here to serve Aylesbury and surrounding areas. We operate a Trading Store, based on the Old Stoke Road Allotment Site. It is open between 9.00am and 12.00 noon on Sundays, and on Thursday evenings in the spring.

There is a wide range of garden requisites available – the ones you would expect, such as Growmore, Blood, Fish and Bone Meal, etc., and the less well known such as Magnesium Sulphate (more commonly known as Epsom Salts, for treating roses, tomatoes, etc).

We also carry a wide range of other sundries such as potting compost, netting, fleece, string, gloves, Phostrogen, Weedol; in fact over 250 items. Our prices are competitive and you will be served by fellow gardeners with whom you can discuss any problem (or just the time of day, if you wish).

We also run a number of events during the year and hold our Annual Show in September. We have a website: www.aylesburygardeningsociety.co.uk where you can find full details or why not pay us a visit at the Trading Store and, if you like what you see, join us.

#### **Aylesbury Vale Community Chest**

Aylesbury Vale Community Chest, a partnership fund between AVDC and Vale of Aylesbury Housing Trust, has awarded over £3m in funding through more than 550 grants to voluntary and community groups in Aylesbury Vale since its launch in 2007. The ten-year fund is now in its eighth year.

A recent project grant to Haddenham Cycle Training CIC has provided 'Bikeability' cycle safety courses at Elmhurst and Thomas Hickman Schools.



£480,000 has been agreed in revenue grants to twelve local charities over the next three years, 2014-17, contributing to nearly £4m of local service delivery. With more than 340 volunteers giving around a thousand hours of their time every week to support these twelve organisations, the benefit to local people is even greater. Aylesbury town-based recipients include Aylesbury & District Citizens' Advice Bureau, Aylesbury Homeless Action Group and Home-Start Aylesbury.

Project applications up to £25,000 are reviewed by the Grants Panel three times a year. The next closing date is 11th July 2014. Microgrant applications for up to £1,000 are considered each month.

#### **Days Out in Aylesbury**



This summer don't forget to explore the variety of things to do on your doorstep. The whole family can spend a day in Aylesbury, starting out at the Roald Dahl Children's Gallery, discovering the world of Dahl characters and stories. Take the kids to one of the many cafés in the town and if it's a bright and sunny day you can sit outside.

#### **Peregrine Falcons**

Aylesbury's Peregrine falcons returned to the County Council building and laid an egg on 21 March.

The platform situated on the building was completely renewed with funds donated by SERCO. Works were completed by February and once the scaffold was down to the eighth floor the birds who have been around all winter began to use the structure again.

If the pair successfully rear chicks, AVDC and the local Wildlife Trust BBOWT will be hosting some 'watch' events where residents can witness the world's fastest animal and hopefully catch a glimpse of young birds. Keep an eye in the skies.

As darkness falls on the Saturday night there is a very moving **Candle of Hope** ceremony where we take the time to celebrate the successes of those fighting the disease and remembering those we have loved and lost. The candles then light our path through the night until dawn rises.

The relayers are entertained over the weekend with a vibrant mix of stalls, live bands, competitions and fancy dress laps, which creates that carnival atmosphere to help make it such a special and memorable event.

#### Florence Nightingale Midnight Walk

Plans for a fifth Florence Nightingale Hospice Charity (FNHC) Gemstone Midnight Walk have been announced, as the ever-popular ladies' night-time challenge returns on **Saturday 12th July** in celebration of the 25th anniversary of the Florence Nightingale Hospice – with 25 silver places for MEN!

There are even more new twists to this year's walk, including changes to the previous route and splashes of silver throughout the night in celebration of our Silver Jubilee year, as well as the trademark bunny ears!

The last four Midnight Walks have raised over £250,000 for the Florence Nightingale Hospice, and it is hoped that this year's event will tip that figure over the £300,000 mark. Last July, hundreds of flashing bunny ears lit up the Oxford Road as 754 ladies (a record turnout) strode out from Aylesbury College to undertake this



Aylesbury College to undertake this formidable challenge in aid of the local Hospice.

FNHC Development & Events lead Karen Shardlow, is keen to see that number increase once again. "We're really looking forward to seeing how well our lucky few men can do alongside so many women – bunny ears compulsory of course!" 
### **Aylesbury Old Town Residents' Association**

In 1987, John Morrison, Trustee ex-officio of Thomas Hickman's Charity, convened a meeting to consider ways in which all the people living around St Mary's might get to know their neighbours better. The idea was enthusiastically taken up, a committee of volunteers was chosen to take the idea forward and the Aylesbury Old Town Residents' Association (AOTRA) was born and has flourished ever since.

One of the defining characteristics of the neighbourhood around St Mary's was evident: a friendly street pattern that, like most of the buildings, originated before the



motor-car was invented. The feeling of town-centre neighbourliness has been reinforced by the so-called "inner relief road" devised in the 1960s by the Highway Authority which encircled the old town centre, so it was decided that the Association should include everybody who had their homes within that ring road.



In order to ensure inclusiveness, AOTRA was not made a card-carrying, subscription based association, but reliance was put on voluntary gifts, whether of time, money, or services. Amazingly that has proved enough to sustain AOTRA for over 25 years.

It welcomes new residents into the neighbourhood, whether as tenants, landlords, licensed occupiers or home-owners. There is a regular newsletter through every accessible letterbox, social events (or more formal meetings when required) and an annual meeting to review the past year, seek ideas on the way forward, and elect a committee for the year ahead. The Association now belongs to the National



Association of Residents' Associations (NORA) and is a corporate member of the Aylesbury Society.

For 21 years, AOTRA has organised 'Secret Gardens' for old town residents and their guests to enjoy, generating many thousands of pounds for local charities as well. This year, the plan is to celebrate this 'coming of age' by a simple garden party for all the past 'Secret Gardeners' and their neighbours.

The proliferation of snowdrops, daffodils, and other spring flowers in St Mary's churchyard is the result of AOTRA's collaboration with the church wardens and AVDC's contractors; and the plan is to pursue our annual churchyard tidy-up by putting forward proposals for its future care, which enables the long-term maintenance of the established tree-avenues.

Currently, the Committee's work also includes efforts to clarify the modified parking permit scheme for residents and their visitors, pursuing changes proposed when AVDC was responsible, in order to alleviate the shortage of space for accommodating vehicles on-street.

AOTRA is also trying to clarify confusion surrounding the town centre pedestrian area signs and other traffic matters – heavy lorries, illegal parking on pavements, and non-observance of the 20mph zone, for example. Members will be participating in the forthcoming Town Centre Plan working groups run by AVDC.

### Pippa North and the WanderHouse



As Artist in Residence at Queens Park Arts Centre, Aylesbury, Pippa North has been busy developing the WanderHouse – a fantastic mobile arts and crafts resource for children and young people. Comprised of numerous 'story objects' the WanderHouse is designed to travel into the community, to be shared with and to inspire young people. This unique project is funded by a national trust, in memory of Amanda Burton, and by Arts Council England. Helen Jauregui caught up with Pippa to find out about the inspiration behind the project.

Creating the WanderHouse was a collaborative process, during which you consulted with young people through workshops; and then along with Queens Park artists and tutors you responded to their interests and ideas. Was this an exciting process, as so many different people were involved?

It was fascinating working with the children as they were from many different age groups and backgrounds and they each had their own needs and focuses as individuals. Our community at Queens Park Arts Centre has been so generous in responding to the project. At its core it is all about collaboration and shared experience. As such I also worked with the Southcourt Children's Centre and Bucks Young Carers, who came to Queens Park Arts Centre to take part in multi-sensory workshops, which included working with clay, water and paints and which built on the children's ideas from there.

You use the term 'story objects' to describe the creations contained within the WanderHouse – can you explain the thinking behind this?

Through my experience of working with young people in the past, I have often used stories as a starting point to inspire and support literacy projects. Conceptually, this links to the WanderHouse and the fact that each object provided has a special significance, story or inspiration behind its creation. The WanderHouse refers not just to the fact that the house can physically wander from space to space, but also, that it allows

thoughts, ideas and emotions to wander and this is another link to imagination and story-telling. It's not just about 'wandering' in a physical sense.

Inspiring cross-curricular engagement, it is also a place maker, with accessible materials which are sourced locally from sustainable or recycled materials. This is really important to me because the impact on the environment is a major consideration in my work.

### Many of the objects within the WanderHouse are in miniature form – why was this important?

It was partly out of necessity. I wanted to create high levels of concentration and intensity, and using small objects that children can hold in their hands was exciting. It's wonderful to have the opportunity to set up a magical landscape and alternative, small worlds. The WanderHouse is all about small world building and I don't think we ever grow out of our enjoyment of that – men, women, children... we are all enchanted by miniature worlds. These worlds can take you and transport you anywhere – the possibilities are endless and this is what the WanderHouse can provide.

### Has the WanderHouse project been inspired by fairy tales or mythology?

In a way, yes, I use stories as a starting point, and I am also influenced by mythology, folklore, architecture and the environment. Two of the tales I'm particularly interested in are the Baba Yaga (Slavic origins) and Hansel and Gretel. However, my influences are endless, and what underpins my investigation as an artist is how

we can share the world, how we can share resources and how we can share each other.

The WanderHouse is a type of social sculpture which allows the internal to be made external in order to make a difference in our communities.



The objects in the WanderHouse have evolved from many different places and experience, there were so many different people working to create objects and using so many processes, that this naturally led into an incredibly original and diverse installation. Many children don't have the opportunity to handle handcrafted, beautifully made objects and such wonderful materials, so I can't wait to take the WanderHouse out into the community to share it with more young people.

#### **Town Mayor's Update**

Over the past few months, I have been particularly inspired by my visits to some of our local schools and colleges. There are pressures on young people today which didn't exist when I was young, and it also seems to me that academic expectations are much higher for everyone. It's easy to suppose that our older brains are just as agile as they once were; my visit to the Rotary Club of Aylesbury Hundreds Interschool Technology Tournament at Aylesbury College proved to be quite a corrective! This annual event helps develop skills in design and in the use of materials, and also promotes cooperation and teamwork. Groups of pupils from our local schools compete to solve an engineering challenge using simple materials and tools. The challenge - to retrieve a ball from a small box and deposit it in a marked place - seemed simple, but I wouldn't have had the first idea how to solve it. Fortunately, I was only presenting the prizes!

In March, I attended the House Music Competition at Aylesbury High School, and was astonished by the talent and enthusiasm of the students. The various teams had designed and directed their own musical programmes, each based around a coherent theme, and often involving their own compositions. The standards of performance were of the highest, and the dedication involved truly admirable.

But although the young have things to cope with today which they never had to experience in the past, there are perhaps fewer of the practical and emotional barriers which used to limit us back then. It was clear from the music the students were writing and performing at AHS that they had access to a vast range of musical forms and ideas to inspire them.

We should also take pride in the work of our primary schools. At the end of March, I officially opened a new library at **Elmhurst School**, and what a wonderful space

it was. A book is like a little extra pair of wings, and the more you can attach and not discard, the richer life becomes. The children themselves were clearly so proud of their library and when they showed me around the school I was struck by how happily they were working, how much they were learning and by how well their lively minds were being developed – by parent volunteers as well as by the dedicated staff.

But learning never stops, and I am myself about to embark on an Open University course (when my term comes to an end). As Mayor, I was invited to visit the OU in Milton Keynes, and gained a new insight into its global reach and ambitions for the future. The OU welcomed its first students in 1971 and now has almost a quarter of a million of them. But there exists a hunger for knowledge and personal development far wider even than that, and the development of new technologies – especially online – is providing new challenges and wonderful new opportunities.

Much of what the Mayor does over the course of a year has, I like to hope, an educative role. By celebrating events like Commonwealth Day and by attending memorial events, artistic performances or citizenship ceremonies, a Mayor can help keep these things in public mind.

The work of our schools and colleges is perhaps the most important of all in ensuring that history and beauty are an enduring part of our local identity. So far as I have seen, our children are taught to respect our history and value beautiful things. Isn't that wonderful?

Aylesbury Town Council have awarded a grant of £2,000 to the project. The money will go towards theatre visits to give the children an insight into art and culture.



#### Young People & Mobile Phones

We live in an age of technology, and young people are often the first to discover something new and interesting. In the last decade mobile phones have developed into smartphones and they have a lot to offer...

The Charity AVYFC runs a number of youth projects in Aylesbury and they gave the young people an opportunity to share what they actually do on their mobile phones. Young people were asked what mobile phone applications they use and also asked if they could describe them for Aylesbury Town Matters readers. The young people agreed that some of the readers might find it interesting to know what is popular and also possible on a mobile phone today.

Young people do use their mobile phones for making phone calls and sending text messages, but now they can also use them as a camera, music player and computer to access the internet. Having a mobile phone has almost become a necessity and with all the gadgets it is no wonder that young people enjoy using them.

One young person said that they are often told that they are being unsociable when they are on their phone. They said that they may be being unsociable with the people around them, but through the phone they are actually linked in with a much wider social community!

The quotes below describe two mobile phone applications that have been popular in 2014.

#### What is SnapChat? by Emma from Aylesbury

"In a nutshell, SnapChat is a conversation with pictures. It is difficult to show emotion in a normal text message, and for example, sarcasm could be misconstrued. However,

with SnapChat you take and send a picture to a friend and have a short message, which you can choose to show for 1-10 seconds.

When you send a SnapChat, you normally take a picture of yourself (also known as a selfie!). When you send messages to your closest friends, you generally pull absolutely hideous faces, often with multiple chins! Photos tend to be more posed and gradually get nicer when you send them to the

guy or girl you really like.

SnapChat can be used with most smart phones, however it is better suited to those with front cameras... Trust me it can be very awkward on a bus or out and about and having to turn the phone around and try and take a picture of yourself!"
