We started on a reflective note at our In Flanders Fields event which marked the start of a WW1 Exhibition at Bucks County Museum. Young and old all gathered together to reflect on harsher times in our history, honouring those that have sacrificed their lives by creating a magnificent wall hanging and poppy display for the museum.



The end of August brought you Hobble on the Cobbles and what a day that was. Two

venues, four stages, twenty one local bands and performers, three Mix96 street stars, one mega slide, eighteen photographers, one marriage proposal (with acceptance) and around 5,000+ happy, dancing, music fans of all ages. Bopping to classic covers from The Dung Beatles and rocking with El Bronson whose wild style got the crowds of Kingsbury on their feet.




Christmas Fair and Carolfest

The annual Aylesbury Town Council (ATC)
Allotments Awards were held in October at the
new venue of Viney House. From what was a very wet
start to the year, the weather improved greatly and
provided an almost perfect growing season for tenants.

We are very grateful to this year's judges, Alderman Ray James (Allotment Warden – Crown Leys), Steve Webb (ATC Outdoor Manager), and Spencer Whitfield (an independent judge) for spending two busy days visiting all the sites and for picking our prize winners. The criteria for judging extended beyond simply considering

the general appearance of a plot. They included the desirability for varied planting (a mixture of vegetables, fruits and flowers) and also considered factors such as composting and cleanliness. The judges awarded prizes to the best three plots at each site, with additional prizes for Best Newcomer and Overall Winner.

The presentations were given by Mayor Cllr Tuffail Hussain, with the 1st prize winners receiving an engraved shield and all those awarded prizes received a certificate and vouchers kindly donated by the Aylesbury Gardening Society.

Matrix Explorer Scouts Clear Town Brook





In September the Matrix Explorer Scouts put on their wellies, waders and working gloves and got stuck in clearing the brook beside the Railway Station.

Explorer Scouts are aged between 14 and 18 and Matrix Explorer Scout Unit, based in Aylesbury, has about seventy members, both male and female. As their contribution to Aylesbury in Bloom and the community, the Explorer Scouts had agreed to clear the area which is a gateway to the town when visitors arrive at Aylesbury station. The area was a grot spot overgrown with vegetation, tree saplings and strewn with litter.

Together with the Town Council, Environmental Agency and Chiltern Railways the Scouts looked at how the area could be best cleared to look welcoming and at the same time be mindful of the wildlife in and around the brook.

The amount of litter picked out of the shrubs left everyone speechless. There is a bin right beside the brook yet most people seem to throw it in the greenery.

Young people often get bad press and the unit members are very conscious of this and are anxious to show the general public that not all young people should be tarred with the same brush!

This project, working in conjunction with Aylesbury Town Council and the Environment Agency, contributes towards their environment partnership award and puts them very much in the public eye. Many people spoke to them while they were hard at work and expressed appreciation for what they were doing.

The Scouts will continue to look after this area going forward and will also start keeping a record of the wildlife and invertebrate which can be found in this area and to feed the information back to the Environment Agency.

This year Aylesbury Town Council entered the town in the regional Britain in Bloom competition 'Thames and Chilterns in Bloom'.

Britain in Bloom is the largest horticultural event in Europe, which has been in existence since 1963. Since 2002 the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) has been organising the campaign. Over 1,000 communities of various sizes enter the competition. Groups (Towns, Villages, Cities, etc) are assessed for their achievement in three core pillars: Horticultural Excellence, Environmental Responsibility and Community Participation.

The awards have been based on the Royal Horticultural Society's medal standards of Gold, Silver Gilt, Silver and Bronze.

Whilst floral displays play an important part in the contest, the main aim of the campaign is to encourage and celebrate local communities improving their local environments. It is a popular campaign, estimated to involve more than 200,000 volunteers in cleaning up and greening up their local area.

Aylesbury is no different and whilst the local campaign is organised and arranged by Aylesbury Town Council we work together in close partnership with Aylesbury Vale District Council, Buckinghamshire County Council, Town Centre Partnership, Vale of Aylesbury Housing Trust, Aylesbury Gardening Society, Bucks Legacy, as well as volunteer groups such as Aylesbury WI, Aylesbury Youth Action, Harding House School, individual volunteers as well as local companies and companies which have a link to Aylesbury.

Aylesbury in Bloom is an all year round campaign and the Town Council works on projects all year round. This year saw us concentrate on wildflower meadows to create urban habitats for pollinating insects.

You may well have seen the Tring Road roundabout or the area by Old Stoke Road and by Anchor Lane subway, which was planted by students from Harding House School to commemorate, remember, pollinate and 'Grow for Gold'.



Kier Homes spent a day with the Outdoor Team clearing up an overgrown area on the corner of Vale Park Drive and Park Street and in the process cleared out beds, TV, a washing machine and more rubbish.

The Town WI cleared weeds by the Arches and planted the area making it a colourful and bright entry into Market Square.









Everyone's hard work to date, has been rewarded by the Thames and Chiltern in Bloom Association at this year's Awards Presentation in Henley. Aylesbury has been awarded 'Silver Gilt'. In the category of Small Cities Aylesbury competed against Bracknell who also achieved a Silver Gilt medal.

In addition the judges have also awarded Aylesbury the regional award for 'Best Horticultural Award' for presenting the horticultural displays. The Town Council would like to thank everyone for their involvement and support and is looking forward to building on this year's successful campaign and to achieve even more in 2015.

In 2006, the RHS introduced the Neighbourhood Awards – now the 'It's Your Neighbourhood (IYN)' campaign – a grassroots sister campaign to 'in Bloom', supporting smaller, volunteer-led community groups focused on improving their immediate environment.

The Town Council is very proud that for the first time Aylesbury had three IYN entries, Hanover Court, Bearbrook Place and Quaker's Friends Meeting House, all three received their certificates at the ceremony too with Hanover Court achieving Level 4 of 5 Levels, already.

"We are hoping to have more IYN entries next year", says ClIr Allison Harrison, Chair of the Communities Committee "Britain in Bloom is an important campaign and we have seen the difference it can make to our local community. Not only does it brighten up the town but it also helps with building pride in place and community engagement. This is a fantastic result and we would like to thank everyone for their involvement".

Bedgrove Road Safety Campaign

Bedgrove Councillors have launched a safety poster campaign for the roads in their ward. After several serious accidents in Bedgrove, including an elderly man, a toddler seriously injured and a five year old injured when crossing between two parked cars it was agreed with Aylesbury Town Council that a road safety campaign should be launched in the area.

With nine schools in and around Bedgrove, the highest concentration in Buckinghamshire and the country, the Councillors felt that by asking local school children to help design posters for the safety campaign on issues such as speeding, inconsiderate parking and dangerous driving it would help them learn about road safety whilst helping the whole community. The winning designs will become the signs that you will see appearing on Bedgrove roads in a few months, similar to schemes elsewhere in the county which were supported by Sir Jackie Stewart.

Cllr Mark Winn said, "Children have such great imaginations and we are sure that the designs they come up with will be a hit with the public. I have seen some poor behaviour by drivers across Bedgrove and it is important that we change people's behaviour before we end up with a tragic accident."

The campaign which is being sponsored by Aylesbury Town Council, with the backing of all four Town Councillors Mark Winn, Tom Hunter-Watts, Jenny Bloom and Penni Thorne and Aylesbury South East County Councillor Brian Roberts. All children in the Bedgrove schools of all ages are taking part and designing posters with two winners chosen from each school. As we go to press the posters are still in design stage. The awards ceremony is taking place in November and is hosted by the Aylesbury Mayor and local Member of Parliament David Lidington. We will be featuring the winning designs in the next issue in March.

Good News for Volunteers!

There is increasing evidence that volunteering is good for health and wellbeing. Age UK Bucks has plenty of opportunities for volunteers to undertake roles that help the local community. These are:

Befriending Plus - Befrienders visit an older person in their local community, once a week for about one hour.

Welfare Benefits - Advisors help someone to apply for benefits that they may be entitled to – such as attendance allowance or pension credits. This would require a visit to the individual to help them through the process.

Memory Advice - This provides support to individuals or their carers who have problems with their memory. Volunteers would be completing specific time limited pieces of work and be linked with a Memory Care Advisor for support.

Work could include helping someone who has memory loss by discussing their concerns they might have, or helping them to access services that may help.

Information and Advice - The Information and Advice service is run from our office in Aylesbury and we offer confidential information and advice to people who ring in – this can be anything from someone wanting information about holiday insurance to talking through residential care options.



The weather was fine and sunny which helped to contribute to the success of the day. Feedback from those who attended was positive and has spurred interest for a similar event in the future.

EDXAylesbury

x = independently organized TED event

A local group of enthusiastic volunteers is bringing 'Ideas Worth Spreading' to Aylesbury at the inaugural TEDxAylesbury event on 25 April 2015 at the Waterside Theatre in Aylesbury.

TED Talks have become a phenomenon, attracting a billion views on the internet. From science to art, psychology to design, TED Talks inspire, enlighten and entertain.

In the spirit of ideas worth spreading, TED has created a program called TEDx to help share ideas in communities around the world. TEDx is a programme of local, self-organised events that bring people together to share a TED-like experience.

Our event is called TEDxAylesbury (where x=independently organized TED event).

At TEDxAylesbury, TED talks, video and live speakers will combine to spark deep discussion and connection in small groups. The TED Conference provides general guidance for the TEDx programme, but individual TEDx events, including ours, are self-organised. This independent TEDx event is operated under license from TED.

Community First Responders

Community First Responders (CFRs) are volunteers who are recruited and trained by the South Central Ambulance Service. They work from home and are available to be deployed by the Ambulance Emergency Operations Centre to anyone who suffers a sudden life threatening medical condition.

It has been established that victims of heart attack, stroke, serious bleeding, breathing difficulties etc. will enjoy a better medical outcome if they receive skilled attention within a few minutes of falling ill. Each CFR is equipped with an emergency intervention kit including oxygen therapy equipment and a defibrillator for use in cardiac arrest situations. CFRs are available to the Emergency Operations Centre to be deployed to incidents in their community so that each patient receives immediate attention and stabilisation before an ambulance arrives.

CFRs are now in place all over the South Central Ambulance region and form a vital link in emergency care for members of the community. CFRs are under the direct control of the Ambulance Service but are funded by public donation with fundraising organised by the CFRs themselves. The CFR service operates as a registered charity through the South Central Ambulance Service League of Friends.

Aylesbury has its own CFR group covering the population of the town and neighbouring villages. The group's CFRs currently use their own cars for day to day operations but it is planned to raise money to buy a fully equipped marked car that will be shared by the group members and therefore constantly available to the local population. It will cost £16,000 to buy and mark the car and a further £2,000 to fit communication equipment. Aylesbury Town Council supported this project with a grant of £2,000.





Spinal Injuries Association

The Spinal Injuries Association (SIA) is a user-led charity that helps spinal cord injuries (SCI) people and their families from the moment they are injured and for the rest of their lives. SIA achieve this through their services, campaigns and training, which aim to take SCI people on a journey from injury to independence.

In Aylesbury the Peer Support Officers, Jackie Bailey and John Leonard provide the support. Both have been living with SCI for many years and have a vast amount of experience to share. This includes returning to work, starting a family and raising their children after sustaining an injury. They also have practical experiences such as travelling and driving.

Jackie and John work all across Aylesbury ensuring that SCI people have the best quality of life. They are in the best position to support people through this difficult time, because they have been through the rehabilitation process themselves. The service addresses these issues by offering: emotional support; practical advice on how to manage their paralysis; advice on how to get back into employment, education, training, volunteering, as well as offering post-discharge visits once someone has returned home.

SCI currently provide a pathway support to thirty-seven SCI members living in Aylesbury. They have the opportunity to attend SIA training sessions at Stoke Mandeville Hospital on a variety of subjects, such as choosing a wheelchair and housing. When attending their annual check-ups at the hospital post-discharge the members can access support from Jackie or John at any time. **Grant awarded £2,000.**

National Citizen Service

About 300 young people, aged 16 and 17, from Buckinghamshire spent four weeks of their summer holidays taking part in a programme that was challenging, fun and developed their skills and confidence.

The four week programme culminated in them planning and spending 30 hours carrying out a social action project. Twenty of these young people working together as a group based in Aylesbury wanted to raise money for the Teenage Cancer Trust which was a cause they felt passionately about.

They decided on a fundraising barbecue but needed a suitable venue to hold it so also took on the challenge of rejuvenating the garden and surrounding area at 9th Aylesbury Scout HQ on Oakfield Road.

This was a massive project but the group weren't daunted and they spent many hours walking around Aylesbury talking to local businesses about their ideas to obtain the materials they needed to renovate the garden and raise as much money as they could for their chosen charity.

It was hard work but the results were worth it. The finished garden looks lovely and is a wonderful area that all those that use the building can enjoy and the barbecue was a great success, raising over £350 for the Teenage Cancer Trust.

The young people should be very proud of their efforts. They have learnt a great deal about themselves, learnt a variety of new skills and have made some new friends along the way.
