During the first week of July our three judges spent two days visiting ten schools across Aylesbury who had entered this year's Aylesbury in Bloom garden competition.

At each school they were greeted by enthusiastic children who all love gardening and who were very proud to show off their garden patch. Judging the schools' competition is especially enjoyable and rewarding but also the most difficult one. All gardens are great and every year our judges find it harder and harder to decide who wins which category.

It is reassuring to know though that there are so many children interested in gardening, and of course, so many teachers, parents and grandparents working hard to nurture that interest.

The emphasis has changed a little over the years from simple floral gardening towards planting for wildlife and for food. During the visits the judges saw and even tasted some great produce and it was noted that edible gardening has been on the increase and ties in well with lessons. A lot of thought is also given about what to plant for pollinating insects and wildlife areas are created.

The best thing about visiting the schools is knowing that the pupils have learnt so much and that they'll carry that knowledge through their lives. As a council we very much hope that they will always be gardeners, that they'll continue to make our towns and villages very attractive places and that they'll be important people in helping to conserve the environment and support the wildlife.

At an awards presentation held just before the summer break, the pupils and their teachers were rewarded for their hard work. All participating schools were invited by Aylesbury Town Council and the Aylesbury Gardening Society to receive their awards for the garden competition and Potato Growing Challenge, which was organised by the gardening society.

Ken Keasley, Chairman of the Aylesbury Gardening Society together with the president of the Society, Mr Ray James and Town Mayor Cllr Allison Harrison awarded the schools with their certificates and trophies for the Potato Growing Challenge. Winner of the Ann Miles Shield for Heaviest Combined Weight of Potatoes was awarded to Turnfurlong Infant School.

Edible Garden has been a great category this year and the judges particularly commented on the big onions they have seen in various school gardens. The judges had the following to say about the 1st prize winner:

"Beautifully kept and very enthusiastic children. Fantastic selection of veg and fruit, good use of flowers in the beds to distract pests."

The 1st place was awarded to **Turnfurlong Infant School**. The 2nd place in the Edible Garden category was awarded to **Haydon Abbey Combined School**.

The next category awarded was **Best Wildlife/Nature Garden**. It is so important to look after our wildlife these days so it is great to see that so many schools entered this category.

The 1st place winner achieved nearly full marks from all judges and impressed them with their knowledge and enthusiasm. This garden has everything wildlife could wish for from bird feeders, butterfly bar to a five star bug hotel. The winner was **Haydon Abbey Combined School**. The 2nd place for Best Wildlife Garden was awarded to **Turnfurlong Junior School**.

In the **Best Recreational/Learning Garden** category the judges were looking for incorporation of different areas or sections into the garden design to facilitate learning, a high visual appeal, use of the garden for outside school events, use of plants and other features with different visual and sensory appeal to facilitate and encourage exploration and imagination amongst pupils. For our 1st place winner the judges had the following to say:

"Very hands on, very eyes on. Good lavender. Very enthusiastic about their garden, explained what everything was, scented flowers, big sunflowers and a storage area for books."

The winner was **Stocklake Park School**. The 2nd place went to **Turnfurlong Junior School**.

The last category was **Best Garden** in a **Pot**. A hotly contested category which was entered by most schools. The judges saw everything from a flower pot to sinks filled with flowers or edible produce. Flower pots are a great way to encourage children to grow and these days there is no limit to the imagination as to what can be used as a pot to plant in.

The 1st prize winner really did let their imagination run wild and used everything and anything that can be used as a container to plant flowers. They also put a lot of effort into decorating the pots using recycled material. If you ever wonder what else one can do with a traffic cone or a toilet or wellie boot then have a look at the 1st place winner's garden. The 1st prize went to Harding House School. The 2nd place was awarded to William Harding Combined School.



Every year Special Awards and Commendations are awarded. The Commendation for Wildlife Gardening went to St Edward's School. Commendation for Enthusiasm for Growth & Development was awarded to Bedgrove Junior School. The Commendation for Edible Gardening was awarded to Pebble Brook School.

The special award for **Most Colourful Pots** wasn't an easy one to decide as everyone made such a great effort. It was therefore a great pleasure to congratulate **Broughton Infant School** on their achievement.

Not every school has had gardening clubs in the past or even an area where they could plant or grow anything so it is great to see new entrants each year. This year's new entrant took an innovative approach to pot gardening and impressed the judges with the wellies they planted and lined up against a wall to brighten it up and the vast variety of flower containers they planted. The **Best Start Up** award went to **Harding House**.

Last year we introduced the "Spade" for Best Garden Overall. As we have already mentioned all gardens are absolutely wonderful and everyone did an amazing job. The winner of this award impressed the judges a lot with their enthusiasm and knowledge and they received one



of the highest markings against the criteria. The "Spade" for Best Garden Overall went to **Haydon Abbey Combined School**.

We would like to say a big thank you to all the teachers at the schools who teach about gardening, growing, sowing, planting and who nurture the pupils' enthusiasm for gardening.

Congratulations again to all schools! They are all winners and we are already looking forward to coming back again next year and seeing how their gardens have progressed and grown over the year.



Schools Potato Challenge

For the second year Aylesbury Gardening Society has organised the Potato Challenge for schools by providing bags, compost and three potatoes of different varieties.

The fourteen entrants responded well to the challenge and the winner was **Turnfurlong Infants School** with a total weight of 3.410kg – this school also received the award for the heaviest single bag – 1.320kg of Kestrel.



Second in the competition was Pebble Brook School and third was Bedgrove Junior School. The Ann Miles Trophy and other awards

were presented by the Society's president Mr Ray James at a joint event with the Aylesbury Town Council.

Founded in 1911, we have over 100 years experience of providing continuous support and a network of social and activity clubs across Buckinghamshire which offer peer led activities and advice.



What's new in Southcourt?

Cycling Project

Cllr Peter Agoro is working with residents on a project to encourage young people and supporting adults to learn basic cycling skills.

Primarily aimed at young people, it will help them to be safer on the roads, participate in safe off the road adventure riding and also teach them key life skills through group participation.

Peter said "This is a brilliant idea to engage young people in an activity that they would love to do whilst adding positive values to the experience. I can't wait to get started."

Peter is currently working with Dan who lives in Southcourt who is an experienced cyclist and someone that wants to give back to the community. As things with the project progress, we'll keep you updated.

Autism Aylesbury

Imagine everything being overwhelming and feeling like everyone else is speaking a different language, even in your home town. Everyday noises – sirens, babies screaming and roadworks can all become stressful, not to mention the problem of having to exchange words and looks with other, everyday people.

Life with autism is not easy. It is a spectrum condition which means each person will be affected in a different way. While autism can have a profound effect on an individual, with the right support people on the spectrum can live full lives, some balancing family life with paid work.

Autism/Asperger syndrome can have wonderful positives, such as astonishing attention to detail and a great memory for facts or being creative. However, apparently unexpected occurrences can cause huge problems for people on the spectrum. Changes in routine, such as a bus being late or a road being closed can cause high levels of anxiety and sometimes result in a meltdown.

Verbal exchanges with others can be difficult, as autistic people can struggle to understand non-verbal cues such as facial expressions or tone of voice.

Over the next year we hope to work with local people, services and businesses to see how we can make Aylesbury autism friendly. But we are going to need help. For more information please contact Felicity Amswych on flissams@yahoo.co.uk or lan King at AylesburyVale@nas.org.uk.

More events are planned for later in the year, including presence at Heritage Open Days, and the Big Draw event in October, which is a day for artists to use the Old Town for inspiration.



St Mary's Church

Come and visit the beautiful 12th century St Mary's Church on St Mary's Square at the heart of Aylesbury's old town. The café is a wonderful place to relax in tranquil surroundings, soak up the history and enjoy excellent meals and snacks, including homemade soups and cakes.

Church services are 8.00am and 10.00am on Sundays. The 10.00am service has Sunday School groups

in age ranges up to 15 years and on the first Sunday of the month the service is for all ages with an interactive sermon involving children and young people.

Weekday services are at 12.00 noon on Tuesdays and Thursdays. There is a Sing and Play group 10.00am - 11.30am on Fridays and a lunchtime classical music concert every Thursday starting at 12.45pm.



Young People Matter to Aylesbury

Twelve companies were set up during 2014/2015 comprising of 130 students. Through setting up and running their own real live companies, Year 12 students aged 16-17 are 'Learning by Doing'. They gain valuable experience and FBI (Federation of British Industry) endorsed employability skills that they will use throughout their lives.

Two schools from Aylesbury Vale made it through to the County Finals, Royal Latin (Reverie) and Sir Henry Floyd (Spectrum). Royal Latin were the winners and went forward to represent Buckinghamshire at the South Central Final, where they picked up awards for Creativity and Best Company Report, recognition awards were also given to Jane Street and Sam Lever for their outstanding support.

The Local Area Board, supported by local businesses, starts the year with Kick Start on the 30th September in Aylesbury College. The seminar will take young people through the information they require to start their company. The contributions from local business people who play the role of "Meet the Experts" is vital, it allows young people to question business leaders face to face to understand the various roles that make up a company. The ultimate aim of each company is to be profitable, learning the functions of all the roles in the company is key to that success.

The companies get an opportunity to try out their skills at the Charity Fair in Friars Square in late December, a great opportunity to meet the public and experience at first hand the skills required to sell.



More than 2,000 Aylesbury residents aged 4 to 84 have joined forces to run more than 25,000 miles over the past 18 months – all in the name of fun and fitness – and anyone can join them whenever they want to.

Each Saturday at 9.00am, people of all ages and abilities have been gathering at the Meadowcroft Open Space to take part in Aylesbury parkrun, a free 5km run. The event is a timed recreational run – not a race – coordinated entirely by local volunteers. A junior parkrun has also launched recently, with youngsters aged 4 - 14 completing a two-kilometre course at 9.00am every Sunday.

Participants who want their time recorded so they can track their improvement simply register on the parkrun website (www.parkrun.org.uk/aylesbury), print a personalised barcode and take this to the event. That barcode is then valid at any of the 600 parkrun events around the world that take place each Saturday, while children can also use their barcode at any junior parkrun on Sundays.

Regional ambassador for parkrun Glen Turner said: "The aim of parkrun is to break down as many barriers as possible to allow local people to take part in regular exercise in a fun, informal and supportive environment. Many of our participants are not able to run the whole way when they start, but over time it is great to see people running more, walking less and revelling in that enormous sense of achievement. After all, parkrun is for everyone – from beginners to Olympians – and everyone in between."


Throughout this process they have built new friendships, developed independence skills by living away from home and given up their time to help others.


