As the heat wave struck Aylesbury in the middle of June, twenty-six teams raced their homemade karts through the fields of Whitehill Park for Aylesbury's 3rd **Soapbox Derby**. This was a fantastic day, enjoyed by participants and spectators alike. One visitor told us "The cars were unbelievable. There was such a variety of cars with some clearly designed for speed, others for amazing detail. I witnessed one car that was steered using a rope; poor kid crashed but he was fine and got a 'good try' applause from the appreciative Aylesbury crowd."

The competition was very close, with a matter of seconds between the top five teams and only three votes separating the top three "Best Looking Karts". Aylesbury on Sea was filled with all of the traditions of the seaside from Punch & Judy, donkey rides and crazy golf to deckchairs, ice-cream and so much more. The Dancing Day trippers were a big hit with the crowd and brought a splash of pink fun to Kingsbury. A visitor described it as an "Excellent event and very well run. Really pleasing that every ride etc. was free – this makes such a difference and there was a real buzz to the town – something you don't experience very often."

We always take on board your feedback and this year ensured that there was something for the smallest of visitors with our water cascade and we continue to improve access, facilities and support for those with a wide range of disabilities.

As we look forward to the rest of the year, don't forget **Tudor Fayre** on Sunday 10 September where – for the first time in Aylesbury – you will be able to see (and help power) a replica of Leonardo da Vinci's flying machine along with a host of other interactive historical displays and entertainers.



Environment Aylesbury in Bloom Garden Competition Awards

It is that time of year again when Aylesbury Town Council organises the annual Aylesbury in Bloom Garden competition, which is open to schools, residents, communal groups and businesses. Whilst the judging for the residents, groups and businesses is still taking place until August, it was the schools who were up first to be judged and awarded for their great efforts.



Earlier this month, the Council's volunteer judges Sandra and Rosemary, together with Cllr Summers visited several schools within the Parish of Aylesbury. All the judges commented on how impressed they were with the children's enthusiasm, knowledge and pride in their crops, wildlife and planting.

This wasn't an easy year for the schools as they all had to contend with the late start to the nice weather, lots of rain, followed by a heatwave. Watering all the garden areas was top priority for all of them.



Nevertheless the standard was exceptionally high and when it came to it, often only half a point separated first, second and third place. The judges saw some great produce ranging from courgettes, potatoes and onions to beans and strawberries, with many varieties in lots of schools.

On 13 July all participating schools were invited by Aylesbury Town Council and the Aylesbury Gardening Society to receive their awards for the garden competition and Potato Growing Challenge, which is organised annually by the gardening society. Aylesbury Town Mayor, Cllr Tom Hunter-Watts, Aylesbury Gardening Society Chairman, Ken Keasley and President Ray James welcomed the pupils together with their teachers and parents.

It was a great evening and Turnfurlong Junior School received first prize and the Ann Miles Shield for Heaviest Combined Weight of Potatoes from the Aylesbury Gardening Society. The focus then moved on to the winners and runners up of the various categories of the school garden competition.





Pebble Brook FED Sixth Form won Best Edible Garden, Haydon Abbey School & Pre-school won Best Wildlife Nature Garden, Stocklake Park School received first prize for Best Recreational & Learning Garden and Pebble Brook Boarding received first prize for Best Garden in a Pot.

The Spade for Best Overall Garden went to Haydon Abbey School &

Pre-school, who impressed the judges with their Wildlife/ Nature Garden and their enthusiasm.

Town Mayor, Cllr Tom Hunter-Watts said: "It is such an honour to welcome the children to this special presentation and to give them their certificates and awards. Their enthusiasm for gardening is really refreshing and I am sure many of them learn skills for life and even garden at home. A big thank you to all of the teachers, parents and grandparents who encourage the children with their work and organise Gardening Clubs. We are all looking forward to next year already to see how their gardens are progressing."

Wow, we have been busy during the last few months!

Our May Madness Playscheme was enjoyed by all the children who attended and had the opportunity to explore textures, colour and creativity. We marbled some paper, painted with shaving foam, made some gloop and created a giant picture, whilst also enjoying the great outdoors and plenty of games.

The After School Club children made a picture for the MASKS charity exhibition, which took place at The Gateway in June. We even got the Mayor's approval for our artwork, which shows all the things that make us smile. Do you like our bright yellow frame and the colourful picture?

We also talked about British Values during May and June, which lead to the children creating a new display at the centre showing what Democracy, Rule of Law, Individual Liberty and Mutual Respect & Tolerance means to all of us and why they are important.

In May we had a visit from Nathan Cooper from Mix 96 who brought us a tree sapling, which we planted in our garden, as we committed to becoming greener during Mix 96's Green Week. We are now nurturing and watering the tree every day to ensure it grows big and beautiful to provide us with plenty of shade during the summer months in the coming years.

As we go to print, the Summer Playscheme will be in full swing and we will have had lots of children new, and old through our doors, but this hasn't stopped us from planning the next Playscheme, which is coming up.

In October half term children have the opportunity to connect with nature during our **Autumn Watch Playscheme**. Bookings are already being taken for the 23 – 27 October and more details are outlined below. One of our big projects during that week is to build a five star bug hotel and make pine cone feeders for the birds.

The children will also have the opportunity to plant bulbs in our garden ready for spring, make a giant spider web in the play hall, make a windsock, create leaf lanterns and a textured leaf collage and learn about the wildlife getting ready for winter. Weather permitting, the children can also play outdoors utilising the

go-kart track and climbing frames or stay indoors where they can choose from a great variety of toys and games.

Introduction to Dementia Alliance

After the launch of the Aylesbury Town Dementia Action Alliance in May, members have been leading the way within their organisations and groups to create a Dementia Friendly town.

With over twenty two members in the alliance so far, and so many positive ways to promote Dementia awareness within the community, let's take a look at one of the members and see what they have done to champion a Dementia Friendly community.



Waterside Theatre - Dementia Alliance

At the Aylesbury Waterside Theatre, we are always striving to work with organisations and make partnerships where possible within our local community. As members of the Aylesbury Town Dementia Action Alliance, we are very keen to highlight the ways in which we are working towards becoming more of an inclusive town for people who live with Dementia.

Our Dementia Friends Training, which thirty-eight of our Front of House, Box Office and Operational staff attended, has ensured that we are creating a Dementia positive atmosphere amongst staff which is really important to the customer's experience in our venue.

Dementia Friendly film screenings at the theatre have been a huge success. They seek to provide a fun and inclusive experience, enabling people living with Dementia, their families and carers, to attend a film in a safe and welcoming environment. We make changes to suit those living with Dementia: the lights are left on low, there are no adverts or trailers and the audience can move around - or sing along to any musical numbers should they wish to. There is also an interval half way through the film with free tea and coffee served throughout the screening.

At £6 per person (carers go free) we've made sure it's affordable for people living with Dementia, their carers and families.

We have had fantastic success so far with these screenings, receiving overwhelming positive feedback, and we can see that there is a demand for this type of event in our town. Audience member Ruth Dennis, attended with her mother Jean and said. "On arrival mum was feeling slightly anxious and agitated as she hadn't visited a theatre for years due to the restrictions her illness has placed on her, and us as a family. She quickly relaxed once the film had begun and we sang, danced, laughed and we reminisced with her, without restriction and without judgement! Such a wonderfully positive experience and thank you to all involved."

We will now be holding screenings as regular events. They will be musical theatre films, to evoke memories and have familiar songs for customers to sway and sing along to. Calamity Jane is being hosted as a Dementia Friendly Screening in Aylesbury Waterside Theatre's Second Space on Sunday 17 September at 2pm. We look forward to seeing you at the theatre!

Have you ever heard the bells ringing at St Mary's and wondered who was on the end of the ropes making that loud and (hopefully) glorious sound?

The answer is that we have a keen team of ringers in Aylesbury, who practise regularly on Tuesday nights and ring for Sunday morning service, as well as weddings, civic and national occasions. Our ages range from 13 up to 70+ and we ring as a service to the church and also because it's a fascinating and challenging hobby in itself.

We are also part of a bigger group of ringers in the area called the Central Buckinghamshire Branch of the 'Oxford Diocesan Guild of Church Bell Ringers (that's rather a mouthful; we abbreviate it to the CBB of the ODG!). Every year a competition is held for bands in the Branch to show off their skills in ringing six bells as perfectly as possible.

This year the competition was held in Wotton Underwood church on 13 May, and our local ringers from St Mary's came first and were able to bring back the trophy to Aylesbury once more. It has had pride of place on the table in the middle of the ringing room for several years now, being taken each year to the striking competition and coming back with us again afterwards.

Maybe next year a team from another tower will win it, but for now this beautiful model wooden bell sits in its glass case high up in the ringing room of St Mary's tower. Any visitors to the tower will be welcome to admire it – maybe you will feel like climbing the spiral staircase on our open day this year which is on Saturday 9

Town Council Meetings

All residents are invited to attend the monthly Town Council meetings, which take place every second Thursday of the month at 7pm in the Council Chamber, 5 Church Street, Aylesbury. Time is allocated at the beginning of the meeting for residents to raise any questions they have.



Aylesbury Town Chaplaincy is five years old! In the summer of 2012 not only did we celebrate the Olympic and Paralympic Games in London, but the first volunteer Chaplains from Aylesbury Town Chaplaincy went out



in the town centre. Five years on we still have Chaplains in the town centre, but also in the District and County Council offices, at the Healthy Living Centre, in Morrisons and at the police station. From September 2017 there'll be Chaplains at Aylesbury College and UCAV.

Chaplains are there to support and encourage anyone

they meet. They act as a friendly presence and are able to offer an independent, impartial and confidential ear for those who want someone to listen to them in times of difficulty or just someone to chat about anything, including spiritual matters if required.

In November 2012, just at the start of one of the coldest winters in years, Street Angels started out in Aylesbury. They still go out nearly every weekend, typically between 11pm and 3.30am on either a Friday or a Saturday night. They are in teams of three, providing practical assistance and a calming community presence in the town centre. They do things such as help people to find their way home safely or provide a listening ear to help defuse situations before they escalate. They also give out bottles of water, flip flops or space blankets and woolly hats on colder nights.

National Careers Service in the Thames Valley rated 'Good' by Ofsted

Jobseekers across the Thames Valley are receiving good quality careers information, advice and guidance says Ofsted. In their recent inspection of Adviza, the not-for-profit organisation responsible for National Careers Service provision in the Thames Valley, Ofsted rated the provider as 'good' in all areas. Adviza provide careers advice and support to around 19,000 adults each year in 85 sites across the region including JobCentre Plus offices, libraries, colleges and community venues.

Ofsted rated Adviza 'good' in all four areas of the inspection: effectiveness of leadership and management; quality of information, advice and guidance; personal development, behaviour and welfare; and outcomes for customers.

The report said that Adviza's National Careers Service advisers and its partners use their extensive knowledge of local job opportunities and courses to improve customers' chances of finding work and/or training.

The inspectors also found that advisers are particularly good at recognising when customers need additional, specialist support (for example for supporting mental health problems, debt management, housing and funding, and support networks for lone parents). Also that advisers are particularly effective in helping jobseekers improve their self-esteem and build confidence to seek employment.

Katharine Horler, Chief Executive of Adviza said: "As a charity, it is particularly pleasing that the inspectors highlighted the effectiveness of our advisers to motivate jobseekers and give them the confidence to move forward."

The National Careers Service provides free information, advice and guidance for adults (19+) including help with CVs, applications, interviews, courses, job searching, apprenticeships and more. Dementia in a BME Community

At the first Dementia Friends session the NCAA attended in May 2016, only three members participated, and whilst that was disappointing, it was very telling of our community.

In a stereotypical African community, Dementia is not regarded as a degenerative condition, but more as a form of madness. Despite living in Britain, those hang ups still ring true for many in the BME Community. As a community group, the NCAA is slowly forming and creating a presence in Aylesbury, and one thing that we wanted to do was to challenge misconceptions of generations past.

With thanks to Marion Child from the Alzheimer's Society, we created twenty eight Dementia Friends at the National Association of Nigerian Communities (UK) Central Executive Committee Meeting in February of this year. Each Branch Chair has now gone to their respective community to create Dementia awareness as well.

But learning the five key messages about Dementia didn't quite seem enough. We wanted to do more. And we wanted to do it in Aylesbury so we contacted Aylesbury Town Council's Dementia Champion, Benedicta Lasoye, and found out about the Aylesbury Town Dementia Action Alliance. By joining the Alliance, we have committed to three simple actions to take as a group to support people who have Dementia.

Our three simple actions are to:

- 1. Welcome fifteen Dementia Friends to our group
- 2. Talk about ageing well in the community
- 3. Spreading Dementia awareness to the young BME community and reduce the stigma associated with Dementia.

We have already surpassed our plans of welcoming fifteen Dementia Friends and are currently well into planning another event looking at how to age well in the community.

From September many childcare providers will start offering 30 hours of free childcare for 3 and 4 year olds, so register before 31 August for a September 2017 take up. If you don't manage to register by then or your child is not quite 3, then your next deadlines to apply are: 31 December (for a January 2018 take up) and 31 March (for an April 2018 take up).


We recommend applying as soon possible as entitlement to 30 hours does not guarantee a place at any one provider, or a particular pattern of provision. The provider you have in mind may not offer the full 30 hours of care, they may not have any spare places, or, they may partner up with another provider to cover the extended hours. The Mayor's Year

It is a wonder and a joy to serve as Mayor. Mayors spend such a lot of time visiting schools, churches, events and new businesses that we get a powerful sense of how much we have to be proud of in Aylesbury. Being Mayor is an honour, but in the course of the year you get to give the honour back: to the carers, the organisers, the befrienders, the people who take time out of their lives to show kindness to others.

I would recommend the role to anyone inspired to take it on! The way to start is to get involved in local politics, and I've been inspired by meeting our Youth Councillors, who are helping to lead our community and participate deeply in its life. Alas, despite being Mayor, I have to keep my full-time job, but I am proud to be a nurse, and was delighted to make my first engagement a visit to Stoke Mandeville Hospital on International Nurses' Day, to thank my colleagues and friends who do their very best with the resources they have, and show kindness and care to those who need it the most.

I also helped launch the Aylesbury Town Dementia Action Alliance. As a nurse working in older people's medicine, it's a cause dear to my heart. The Alliance is helping businesses, charities and local groups support people with dementia and make Aylesbury a safe and welcoming place for them. Initiatives like this need people with the will and the kindness to make them succeed, and there is certainly no shortage of that here in Aylesbury. Isn't that the best attribute a town can have? To be rich in community spirit.

The nature of community was a focus for discussion in the aftermath of the horrific terrorist attacks which have disfigured these past few months. I attended an open discussion following the London and Manchester attacks at the Multicultural Centre as well as a Community Iftar meal at Aylesbury Mosque. At both events, I was moved by the willingness of everyone to listen and to learn from one another. Kindness redoubled in the face of aggression, patience in the face of abuse: nothing is more lethal to the ideologies of hate.

Flower arranging was something completely unfamiliar to me when I helped celebrate the Diamond Anniversary of the Aylesbury Flower Club in May. Now I know about guard petals, phototropism, and how to recognise a phlox! I also appreciate the huge amount of skill and

hard work that go into producing the glorious displays one sees in churches or at state events. It is a truly life-enhancing craft, and new members are always very welcome at the Flower Club, who meet each month at Aylesbury Grammar School.

In June I paid a visit to Bucks Vision, and saw some of the wonderful work they do as a local charity in supporting people with sight loss. It's amazing to see the range of the appliances which are available now to make everyday life a bit easier. They are always in need of volunteers who can spare a small amount of time to provide lifts to appointments or help with office tasks, and they are a very friendly and dedicated group of people.

Mayor's Charity



Each year the new Mayor nominates a charity which he or she will support. For me this year, it is InspireAll. I have seen in my nursing work the longlasting damage inflicted by trauma and abuse. The work of repair and healing is long and demanding and essential. Domestic violence, for example, affects both men and women, it affects all ages, all classes and all ethnicities, but not every age, every class or every ethnicity gets an equal chance to find help. InspireAll is a small organisation which provides free expert counselling to people in need, and is able moreover to reach victims who might otherwise fall through the gaps, who might find no one else who understood their background and their struggle. Do look out for their leaflets and for information about their work which will be available at our town events or on the Town Council website. The need is great, and I hope that by raising funds, our town can help InspireAll reach out and grow.



The club was founded in 1920 by local business men. The club has grown to become an inclusive club, with mixed membership. The majority of games are now played as mixed ladies and men's teams. The club also has juniors, who are encouraged to play in matches, as they represent the future of the game. On Saturday mornings qualified coaches run junior coaching sessions for youngsters from 10 to 18 years of age. This year the club hosted the first Bucks Junior Academy event.

The club looks for continued improvement latterly by making the premises wheelchair accessible, widening passageways and doors and installing a toilet for wheelchair users. Special bowls green wheelchairs have been purchased using a William Harding Trust grant. Each year a match takes place against a team from The British Wheelchair Bowlers. There is an arrangement with Stoke Hospital Spinal Unit for patients to play free of charge.

Each week during the season, there is a busy programme of matches, mostly mixed, both friendly and competitive. This provides an attractive way to keep fit and active. The U3A have a bowls session each week. AVDC have been running Sportivate each week throughout May, June and July.

This year using a generous donation from a local businessman, and donations in memory of a long standing, and former president of the club, the club was instrumental in installing, on the Sports Club premises, a defibrillator which has been registered with the emergency services.


turning nineteen in the summer, his passion and enthusiasm will be missed greatly.















