# **Aylesbury in Bloom Garden Competition Awards**

As part of its all year round Aylesbury in Bloom campaign Aylesbury Town Council organises an annual garden competition for residents, schools, organisations and businesses.

We've already reported on the school winners in our last magazine and now it is time to present the winners of the residents, businesses and organisations categories, who received their awards in September. This year's categories ranged from Best Front Garden, Best Back Garden, Best Edible Garden, Best Wildlife/Nature Garden, Best Container Garden and Best Communal Garden.



The gardens were judged by volunteer judges Sandra Ferguson, Rosemary Brown, Anne Brooker and Cllr Denise Summers, who are all keen gardeners and horticulturalists.

As always this was not an easy job as all entrants' gardens looked fantastic and the standard keeps rising year on year. After much deliberation and debate the judges gave the following awards.

Best Front Garden – Mr P Welch Best Back Garden – Mr R Murray Best Edible Garden – Mr R Murray Best Wildlife/Nature Garden – Mrs L Kynaston Best Container Garden – Mr & Mrs Quanico

During their six days of looking and marking all gardens the judges also saw some amazing Communal Gardens, all of them with a different purpose. One was to provide respite to patients, another was to improve the look of an area outside a block of flats (which also brought the residents closer together) and another was to explore senses and enjoy tranquillity. Once the judges had seen all six Communal Gardens and after a lengthy debate the Mayor's Award for **Best Communal Garden** was awarded to the **Florence Nightingale Hospice Charity**. Each year the judges choose an Overall Best Garden winner, from all resident entrants. As the standard was extremely high the judges had some lengthy conversations before a majority decision was reached.

The **Overall Best Garden** winner of the crystal trophy was **Phil Welch**. The judges described the garden



as amazing, perfect and stunning. The garden has lots of interesting areas, artefacts, statuary and the plants are in a good and healthy condition. The runner-up and commendation prizes were also awarded to the recipients during the awards presentation, which took place at The Railway Club.

The judges reiterated that all the gardens they had seen throughout the summer were simply stunning and they enjoyed seeing the great effort everyone puts in. We would like to thank Michael Anthony Estate Agents for their support and sponsorship for this yearly garden competition.

Town Mayor, Cllr Tom Hunter-Watts said "It is a great pleasure to know that we have so many welltended gardens in our town. Gardening is a wonderful recreational activity, good for the body and good for the soul. It doesn't matter how big or how small the garden is, you can create amazing flower displays in even the smallest of spaces, as many of our entrants prove each year. I would like to congratulate everyone who took part in the competition. They have all done superlative work! ### Allotment Awards 2017

The 2017 Aylesbury Town Council Allotments Awards were held on 5 October at the Railway Club, Aylesbury. Aylesbury Town Council would like to express their thanks to Alderman Ray James (Allotment Warden, Crown Leys) and Joe Benham (Secretary, Aylesbury Gardening Society) for judging the allotment plots, which with over 680 plots over seven sites is not an easy job.

It was apparent, during the judging, that it has been a very good year for soft fruit, with many tenants' trees absolutely laden with apples and plums and plenty of raspberries, blackberries too. We are sure that a lot of jam making has taken place to make good use of the harvest. The judging criteria extended beyond simply considering the general appearance of a plot. Included was the desirability for varied planting (a mixture of vegetables, fruits and flowers) and also factors such as composting and plot cleanliness were considered.



The judges awarded prizes to the best three plots at each site, with additional prizes for Best Newcomer and Overall Winner. The presentations were made by the Deputy Mayor, Cllr Mark Willis with the first place winners receiving an engraved shield. In addition, prize winners received a certificate and vouchers, which were kindly donated by the Aylesbury Gardening Society.

### Moving Closer to a Dementia Friendly Town

From Aylesbury being officially acknowledged by The Alzheimer's Society as a town working to become Dementia friendly; to the creation of over 1000 Dementia Friends and the launch of the Aylesbury Town Dementia Action Alliance in May 2017, as a community, we are really making progress in our quest to create a Dementia positive town.



Our Dementia Champion has created another school of Dementia Friends at St Edwards RC Junior School to which pupils were very receptive to the five key messages about Dementia and have already thought of many simple ways to support people with Dementia.

As one of twenty five members in the Alliance, we have looked at what it really means to have Dementia, living with the challenges of everyday tasks many of us may take for granted.

Loneliness and isolation were highlighted areas we focused on this year through our #FallBackGiveBack campaign, and we successfully worked in association with AVDC, Thames Valley Police, Vale of Aylesbury Housing Trust and Bucks County Council on the Quarrendon Street Association to build a stronger and safer community.

In September, a virtual Dementia tour hosted by one of the Alliance Members, Avondale Care Home, highlighted the physical and emotional aspects people living with Dementia experience. We learnt that all behaviour is communication and here are some quotes from members on the tour.

#### Quote from Dr Mahuya Kanjilal, Dementia Friends Champion & Alliance Member

"The virtual Dementia tour on 27 September at the Avondale Care Home completely changed my awareness on people living with Dementia. It's a different world full of confusion, disorientation, pain and chaos. Still can't believe almost one million people in UK are now living with those feelings, which I could not cope with for 15 minutes. We need to act quickly and proactively as a society to raise more awareness about the way people think, talk and behave about the condition. We all have a role to play in making our society a Dementia friendly one. There are many simple actions we can take such as checking in on loved ones and friends, being neighbourly and revisiting a positive community spirit which will see a continued positive change which will be felt and appreciated for generations to come."

"My nan is living with Dementia, this virtual tour gave me an insight into certain aspects of her life that she may experience on a day to day basis. I left with more knowledge than I ever had regarding Dementia. A worthy experience which I would recommend to all." Chris

"I found it a very interesting experience and it will help inform how we work with our customers who live with Dementia. I think it's a worthwhile experience for all to gain a better understanding."

### Neighbours' Street Scheme to Promote Community Spirit

Neighbours on the Quarrendon estate in Aylesbury are being invited to stand together street by street in a scheme to combat loneliness, isolation and develop a community where neighbours look out for one another.

The scheme, spearheaded by Buckinghamshire County Council, would like to recruit residents in every road and provide them with resources and free workshops to heighten awareness of issues such as doorstep crime, scams, domestic abuse and nutrition, to increase the wellbeing and safety of the community.



Scam and doorstep crime figures among Quarrendon's 1,700 homes are high which has a huge impact on health and wellbeing. Free workshops will help residents protect

themselves and their neighbours against phone, mail scams and doorstep criminals. Other planned workshops include Dementia Friends and Domestic Abuse awareness sessions.

The County Council piloted the Street Association idea in Hughenden and, six months from its launch earlier this year, the scheme thrives in eight villages, with 60 Street Members covering 37 roads, and more than 30 attending training workshops.

The scheme encourages residents to request an information pack to raise awareness of these issues and promote safety and wellbeing among their neighbours. The Street Association is working in partnership to complement what is already in place. The Street Association model in Buckinghamshire has been developed with funding from the Police and Crime Commissioner.

# Early Intervention Service helps to prevent Homelessness

A range of issues in people's lives can put their housing at risk, challenges such as job loss, family breakdown and bereavement. If several happen at the same time their ability to cope is affected and they may need help to keep their home.

The **Resilience Service**, provided by the local charity **Connection Support**, helps people at risk of becoming homeless, before they get to crisis point.

The service is free and was commissioned by a consortium led by Aylesbury Vale District Council, working alongside the other district councils in Bucks and Buckinghamshire County Council.

The Resilience Team offer practical advice and support, as well as guidance on financial matters and help with new skills, to build confidence and prevent homelessness.

Thirty seven year old mum of four, Jasmine, has already benefited from the Resilience Service pilot project. A victim of domestic violence, she found herself socially isolated and struggling with her finances and was identified as at risk of losing her home. A Resilience Team officer helped her get back on her feet, so that she is now better able to cope and remain in her property.

Karen Ferguson, who leads the Resilience Service Team at Connection Support says: "Early intervention is key with this service, identifying anyone who could be at risk of becoming homeless. Our officers work with people to build on their strengths, to improve their life skills and look at everything that's going on in their lives, giving them the resilience to prevent homelessness now and in the future."

Aylesbury College and Amersham & Wycombe College have announced that they have merged to form Buckinghamshire College Group.

The merged College will continue to operate from its three main campuses in Aylesbury, High Wycombe and Amersham, plus University Campus Aylesbury Vale in the centre of Aylesbury.

#### What is domestic abuse?

Any incident or pattern of incidents of controlling, coercive or threatening behaviour, violence or abuse between those aged 16 or over who are or have been intimate partners or family members regardless of gender or sexuality.

In our view domestic abuse is physical, sexual, psychological or financial abuse that takes place within an intimate or family-type relationship and that forms a pattern of coercive and controlling behaviour regardless of gender or sexuality.

This can include forced marriage and so-called 'honour crimes'. Domestic abuse may include a range of abusive behaviours, not all of which are in themselves inherently 'violent'.

#### Who can help?

Asking for support and advice is often a very difficult thing to do if you are feeling isolated or low in yourself. You may not even feel that you deserve to have support. It is important to know that there are services out there that can provide advice at the right level for you, your children, family and friends.

# Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan (VALP)

#### LAST CHANCE TO COMMENT

The final round of consultation on the Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan (VALP) is under way and runs until Thursday 14 December. Residents, businesses, community groups – and any other interested parties – are welcome to have their say:

- You can find the VALP and comment online by going to **www.aylesburyvaledc.gov.uk/localplan**
- Go to your local library or the AVDC office at The Gateway to read the paper version and comment in writing.

The finalised plan will be sent to the government inspector in January. Any comments made at this stage will also be sent to the inspector who can make amendments to the plan. This incredibly complex plan has developed over the last few years with public comments being considered as part of the process. When it is finalised and approved by the government inspector, it will manage and direct growth in the Vale up to 2033.

#### VALP KEY FACTS

- It needs to plan for about 27,000 new homes by 2033

   though around half of these are either already built
   or have planning permission
- Almost two-thirds will be built in and around Aylesbury as part of the Garden Town vision
- Other growth areas are Buckingham, Haddenham, Winslow, and a large housing development site at Salden Chase on the edge of Milton Keynes
- We are exploring the potential of housing at RAF Halton once it has closed in 2022
- Smaller levels of growth are planned at villages
- At present a new settlement is not being proposed. This may change once we have a clearer understanding of the government's intention for the east-west expressway between Oxford and Cambridge.

### Mayor's Update

A couple of weeks ago I had little plastic spikes put into my shoes and I was left in a dark room surrounded by disorientating lights and bizarre random sounds. It was difficult under the circumstances to make a cup of tea. Or do very much at all. What the experience was actually intended to do was to bring home the reality of living with dementia, of hallucination and delirium. What I found myself doing was almost nothing, just retreating into myself so as to try and keep my bearings.

As a nurse, I look after acutely delirious and demented patients every working day, but my fifteen minutes or so in the strange room gave me a good deal of unexpected insight. Of course these days much can be done to help. Gentle and attentive care can break through the noise and do something to soothe the anxiety, at least for a time. It's a pity that so often our hospital wards are the least restful places imaginable. But mostly those with dementia live their daily lives in the same town as the rest of us, and the work the Council is doing through the Aylesbury Town Dementia Action Alliance is building networks of support which can provide a much-needed lifeline.

That was a rather unusual engagement, but I've had a great many others. For example, I had a fine time at the Jonathan Page Play Centre in August, and was kept out of trouble and usefully employed for a whole day. There was heaps to do – craftwork, songs and games, books to read and outdoor play. The children kindly made me a mayoral hat, which was charming, although one had to crouch down when going through doorways.

An absolute highlight for me this quarter was the Parklife weekend, which drew our largest ever crowds and provided fabulous family entertainment over the two days. Whether it's rock or classical or anything else, live music is music as it should be experienced – just as all food should be eaten out of doors, ideally, with friends and family around and perfect late summer weather. We were lucky in that respect, as it seemed to have rained almost every day prior, which was at least good for our gardens, to a degree.

On that note, it was a great pleasure to present the awards for our Aylesbury in Bloom Schools' Competition and thank pupils and teachers for all their creativity and dedication. "Some", as Kipling wrote, "can pot begonias and some can bud a rose, and some are hardly fit to trust with anything that grows". I am afraid I fall into the latter category, but it's wonderful to see children set on the right path at an early age, with an understanding of the natural environment and an awareness of how good food is grown.

There is so much going on in Aylesbury, not just in the summer time but the whole year round. Our Tudor Fayre was a great success, and I was able to introduce my three year-old son to hawks and to a hurdy-gurdy. The reproduction Da Vinci flying machine was an extraordinary object to behold, and one couldn't help but wonder what might happen if one put it to the test. Queen's Park Arts Centre is a treasure for the town, an amazing creative hub with a wide range of workshops, exhibitions and performances. It was an honour to attend their Open Day, and see for myself the diversity of things being drawn, carved, shaped, played, danced and enjoyed.

There will be many more events and engagements to come, including the Mayor's Christmas Carol Service on the 3 December at 5.30pm at St Mary's Church. I hope to meet as many townsfolk as I can over the next half-year. If you see me at any of our civic events and occasions, do say hello.

# Aylesbury Parkrun

I first came across 'Parkrun' two years ago, after publicity about a local council in Bristol which had demanded a fee for the weekly five kilometres run in one of their parks.

Having done some running myself, I googled to find if there was a course in Aylesbury and was surprised to find that there was – in Meadowcroft! All you need is to give an email address and basic information such as name, gender and date of birth. You are allocated a 'barcode' which you print out and paste on a piece of card and you take this to every event – parkrun motto is DFYB – don't forget your barcode, but it's not needed to participate. Just turn up in time for a 9am start on Saturday.

There is also a junior version (for 4 to 14 year olds, and their parents). This is 2 kilometres twice around a course in plain vision on Sunday mornings.
