You'll find St George on a fine white steed and a dragon that is more sweet than scary. The Queens Park Arts Centre will be showcasing a condensed version of Twelfth Night, with more activities to be confirmed closer to the event. The annual Scout parade leaves Market Square at 2.45pm led by the Amersham Marching Band. This all takes place in Market Square from 11am – 4pm on Sunday 22 April.

Registrations are now open to take part in our fourth **Soapbox Derby** which takes place in Whitehill Park, so if you've thought about racing, why not make 2018 the year you give it a go? The fun starts at 11am, with the first timed race at approx. 11.30am. ### Allotments



Aylesbury Town Council manages seven allotment sites in Aylesbury; Ardenham Lane, Bierton Road, Bedgrove, Crown Leys, Old Stoke Road, Tring Road and Whaddon Chase – as shown on the map. Even though we have over 600 plots, we still have waiting lists with some sites proving more popular than others!

We manage the list by allowing only one waiting list entry per household, providing a choice of a 2.5, 5 or 10 (maximum) pole plot and encouraging the sharing of plots between family and friends. With 'beginners' in mind, we are endeavouring to provide more 2.5 pole plots on all sites, to give the new allotment gardener a manageable piece of land to start with.

We also have Wardens on each site, who with their wealth of gardening knowledge, will be able to give you advice and answer any questions you may have. If they are not about, having a chat with your neighbours on the site may result in some useful hints and tips and also new friendships. We carry out regular inspections of the sites to ensure that plots are being managed by allotment holders, address any problems they may have and to make sure all is running well.

The judging for our Annual Allotment Competition takes place at the end of July and as all the plots are considered by our Judges – anyone could be a prize winner. There is even a special prize for the 'Best Newcomer' so there is something for our new gardeners to aim for.

## Stonham's 'Bearbrook Green Fingers'

'Bearbrook Green Fingers' are a group of volunteer gardeners who all live at the supported housing service in Aylesbury, provided by Home Group. This is the fourth year that they have entered the 'lt's your Neighbourhood' community initiative run by Britain in Bloom and were awarded an 'Improving Level' showing that real progress is being made in their garden.

Everything that is planned and worked on is all down to people who want to improve their outside space, and their own wellbeing as well as seeing their ideas come to life. The garden is a great place to have a chat about life's problems surrounded by nature, making a home for wildlife is an added bonus, and starting plans for the future. It is well known that gardening has a positive effect on people, but it is also great to see how well your efforts are received by others who see the results in bloom.

There is now a small workshop making bird boxes, bird tables, hedgehog hotels and other homes for wildlife all made from donated off cuts of wood and old pallets. In the near future these will be donated to causes around Aylesbury. The volunteers are also in the process of writing letters to ask local businesses for help in achieving this. It is with justified pride that the clients who live at Bearbrook Place have proven that with goodwill and encouragement great things can be achieved which has inspired others to pick up a trowel.

## Local RSPB Group

The Aylesbury Local RSPB Group actively supports the work of the RSPB through a series of regular monthly indoor meetings and occasional coach and car trips. We visit RSPB nature reserves and other sites of interest in the area. We welcome all with an interest in nature and conservation to join us and help make a difference for birds and wildlife.

Our monthly meetings and talks are held at the Prebendal Farm Community Centre, Fowler Road, Aylesbury, HP19 7QW. You do not need to be a RSPB member, all are welcome to join our talks, coach and car trips. All talks start at 7.30pm and upcoming events include Monday 23 April, 'Action in Nature' by Mike Wilkes. Entry to the talks is £3.00 for group members or £4.50 for visitors, to include refreshments.



We also have two group coach trips on 22 April to RSPB Rainham Marshes, Essex and 20 May to RSPB Lakenheath Fen, Suffolk. Coach trips cost £10, free entry to reserves for RPSB members, small entry fee otherwise. For more details visit our website **www.rspb.org.uk/groups/aylesbury** 

## Buckinghamshire Owl and Raptor Group (BORG)

BORG work throughout Buckinghamshire to protect and encourage box dwelling birds of prey, and rely on sponsorship and donations, both from businesses and the general public, to fund this work. During 2017 we relaunched our website, established two new initiatives 'Friends of BORG' and our Twitter account (follow us on **@Borg\_Owl\_Raptor**), attended various events (including the Winslow Show, Bucks County Show and College Lake) and gave presentations to groups including AVDC, all of which led to an increase in awareness from the general public and support from landowners. We also built and installed 50 new boxes.



As part of our monitoring we submitted over 130 nest records to the British Trust for Ornithology – our highest ever number – together with 221 ringing records, of which 23 were adult birds, 6 re-trapped birds and 192 chicks. 2017 was a successful year for our Barn Owl and Tawny Owl populations, but not so for Little Owls and Kestrels. We will therefore be aiming to increase our support for these species in 2018. The early months of 2018 will see our volunteers checking boxes, to see which are in need of repair or replacement, and undertaking site assessments. Site assessments vary immensely, but are usually very positive and often lead to an increased workload for our volunteers.



## Aylesbury Homeless Action Group

Homelessness is a high profile issue within the national media. However, within Aylesbury Vale it is an issue that can easily be overlooked. 'Hidden homelessness' remains a real issue for people. There are a number of people within our community who are sofa surfing, sleeping in vehicles, sheds, disused buildings and offices. These people rarely make the headlines.

Aylesbury Homeless Action Group (AHAG) is a local charity situated in the heart of Aylesbury. We provide housing advice and support to any person over the age of 18 years (with non-dependents) who is homeless, facing homelessness or vulnerably housed.

This is achieved through supporting people to access safe, affordable housing, address any underlying issues and to motivate them towards independent living. AHAG provides a number of different services within Aylesbury Vale. We offer a number of local outreach drop-ins within the town. We also operate from a central office to provide further one-to-one support with a specialised case worker.

AHAG offers a range of interventions for those people with a housing need. These include basic services such as ID, postal address, laundry facilities and access to healthcare. We also provide more specialised services such as assistance to appropriate housing, benefits, budgeting, employment support and on-going tenancy support. Within the past year AHAG have supported 238 people who have experienced a housing crisis.

## Buckinghamshire Mind calls for Volunteers in Aylesbury

Buckinghamshire Mind, the mental health charity, is recruiting volunteers in Aylesbury for its Befriending Service, which provides one-to-one support for adults who are lonely or isolated as a result of mental ill-health.

"We urgently need people in Aylesbury to become volunteer befrienders to help people in their local area. Bucks Mind provide full training, ongoing support, expenses and time credits for our volunteers. We work positively by introducing people to each other on a friendly, informal and supportive basis. The aim is to promote confidence, independence and address the isolation people with mental health problems often experience." Zoe Sole, Befriending Coordinator, Buckinghamshire Mind.

Buckinghamshire Mind's Befriending Coordinators recruit and train volunteers who then form 'partnerships' with people from the local community living with a mental health condition. Partnerships are facilitated by Bucks Mind support workers with volunteers and service users meeting once a week for an hour to two hours, for six months (short term) or one year (long term). They can be based around a specific activity, learning a particular skill or simply a cup of tea and a chat in a local coffee shop.

"My experiences as a volunteer befriender have made me realise how mental ill-health can so easily lead to isolation and loneliness and to recognise that a person does not need to be living alone to be lonely. There most definitely is a 'feel good factor' about befriending, where you can see first-hand how the small amount of time you give, can impact the quality of life of another person. I like to view befriending as a first stage in breaking isolation; it is during befriending that the possibility of moving forward into wider social contact can be explored and supported." Volunteer Befriender for Buckinghamshire Mind.

People who have benefited from Buckinghamshire Mind's Befriending Service have provided very positive feedback about their experience: "I am back in work. Befriending helped me get out of a rut." "Befriending has given me confidence and changed my attitude." "I'm getting more confident and helping to improve things for myself."



### Lindengate

**Driving out of Aylesbury towards Wendover you will pass Lindengate, the award-winning local charity.** Lindengate is a five acre garden, a haven where gardening, craft, construction and cooking activities are used to help people living with depression, dementia, loneliness, autism and many other Mental Health needs. The approach called Social and Therapeutic Horticulture (STH) is gathering increasing interest and recognition amongst medical professionals.

Lindengate Gardeners (service users) and Volunteers enjoy being part of a friendly community, which helps reduce the social isolation of mental health. The charity uses a mix of beautifully designed gardens and personalised therapeutic activities, overseen by a mix of gardening, health and therapy professionals. Activities are chosen, by Lindengate staff, that will optimise each individual's recovery and wellbeing. This requires a great deal of planning and many Volunteers to prepare the activities and support Gardeners, so they get the most from every visit. New Gardeners can be referred by a health or social care professional or it is possible to self refer. There is a women only group on Wednesday afternoons and Memory Pathways; a drop-in session for people living with dementia and their carers. The group meets twice a month for activities and a shared lunch.

By watching the seasons unfold and the garden constantly changing: the spring bulbs, a summer wildflower meadow, a profusion of asters along the walks in the autumn, and the views of the ducks on the pond in winter, people feel connected to nature. Many of those benefiting from weekly sessions at Lindengate find that this, as well as the gentle exercise and the chance to chat to other people, is an essential boost to their wellbeing. The Volunteers appreciate the positive effect working in the garden has on their lives as well. And getting to try the delicious recipes and cakes cooked in the kitchen, using freshly picked produce from the gardens and polytunnels, is another bonus!

You can visit the Lindengate Gardens on **Saturday 9 June**, 12 midday till 4.30pm for the Lindengate Fair and again on **Saturday 6 October** for the Lindengate Open Day. SeeAbility provides extraordinary support and champions better eye care for people with learning disabilities and Autism, many of whom have sight loss. We know that blind and partially sighted people face significant challenges when it comes to obtaining information in the right format which suits their needs and we are working to change this. A generous grant from The Rothschild Foundation has provided much needed funding to support us to buy a Braille embosser and we are working in and around Aylesbury to help local businesses and community organisations to make their communications more accessible.



James Wilson has sight loss and recently fulfilled his ambition of performing comedy using a Braille script at Stand Up for SeeAbility, headlined by Jo Brand

Braille is a tactile writing system used by people with sight loss. It is traditionally written with embossed paper. The embosser will enable us to create Braille documents. Having documents in Braille helps people to make informed decisions and protect their own privacy, retaining their independence whilst being able to fully participate in society. In particular, Braille is highly valued because people can read and write information themselves, something that is especially important when it comes to confidential information.

In 2017 SeeAbility opened purpose built accommodation and support service for 14 people in Aylesbury. We are supporting individuals to develop their skills by providing Brailling services to help businesses and community organisations make their information and literature accessible. ### Residents in Quarrendon Make Their Streets More Than Just a Name

The Quarrendon Street Association has been recruiting residents to be the eyes and ears on their street that keep their neighbours safe and well. The Street Association members receive information packs covering scams and isolation which also includes a toolkit to direct neighbours to specialised support services if needed. Whilst the role of Street Member is not hands on, members in Haines Close decided to join forces and strengthen their community.

With the help of the introduction letters in their packs, members were encouraged to visit their neighbours to share



information to ward off scammers. The visit uncovered other vulnerabilities in the Close including residents who needed help maintaining their gardens. Not stopping there, they also wanted to take action regarding a litter problem which was a concern for many residents as children were exposed to a wide variety of items when playing, including needles and broken glass. Eight sacks were gathered over several days and promptly collected by AVDC. The area has since been maintained which has initiated positive comments from other neighbours.

Volunteer Street Lead for the area Jan Seaton said "A positive result of people getting to know their neighbours was demonstrated recently when it snowed. The Close was full of adults and children making snowmen, throwing snowballs, pulling sledges and generally having fun. This has not happened in the 27 years I've lived in the Close and I hope it's an outcome of the Street Association".

The scheme is also working with local businesses and community groups to combat loneliness including St Peter's Church in Coventon Road. Residents are encouraged to attend and enjoy company over a free cuppa at the Community Café every Thursday from 10.30am.

### **Town Mayor's Update**

It's 2018. (I'm starting to have to think about what year it is). We're quite deep into the 21st Century at this point, but I remember that back in the 20th the whole idea of a 21st seemed like total science-fiction. And yet the young people I have met this year have known no other century. And many of those born this year will live to see the 22nd.

Our recorded history is really very short in generational terms, and every generation seems to worry about the generations that succeed them. Personally, I feel very confident about the future! In the past few months, I have really come to see how much strength and ability our young people have. I enjoyed some marvellous singing by the pupils from Bedgrove Junior School who performed at our Town Carol Service (sincere thanks also to Aylesbury Choral Society and Aylesbury Concert Band), and Deputy Mayor Mark Willis was hugely impressed by the Mandeville School Carol Concert – a school with a great reputation for music. I saw some beautiful singing and dancing by children at the Diwali Celebrations in October as well. I loved the laughter and fun at our Halloween and Christmas celebrations, and I have dressed up in my robes and regalia on a fairly regular basis in order to share our traditions with the young and to help tell the story of our town.

Mark and I also treasure the memory of sharing in the Christmas celebrations at Zoomania with Bucks Young Carers. Many young people take on adult burdens at a very young age, and the town owes a debt of gratitude for the much needed guidance and support that this great local charity provides.

In November, alongside hundreds of others, from every walk of life, young and old, I remembered the fallen, and thought of how much youthful promise had been sacrificed in war this past century. In addition to the Sunday remembrance service, the Town Council holds a short ceremony at the war memorial in the Cemetery, at which the Mayor gives a reading. I chose a short poem by Wilfrid Gibson, who seems largely forgotten now, one of the first 'soldier poets' of the Great War. It's spoken by the ghost of a soldier of the Napoleonic wars who walks alongside a future comrade, the future of 1914:

"Once I too marched in Flanders,	"But now you march in Flanders,
The very spit of you,	The very spit of me;
And just a hundred years since,	To the ending of the day's march
To fall at Waterloo.	I'll bear you company."

The centuries are short, and for better or worse our descendants in the future will be the very spit of ourselves.

In January I made a visit to the Bucks Army Cadet Force and the RAF Air Cadets in the company of Mayor's Cadet Cpl Chloe Keeping. Chloe herself has been a great ambassador for the Cadet Force and has given exemplary support to our Civic Occasions. It was heartening to see the discipline, dedication and good humour of all these very fine young people. I even learned a certain amount myself, revising my adult life-saving skills, and discovering the difference between North, Magnetic North, Grid North and True North. Who would have thought (if you weren't an RAF cadet) there'd be quite so many of them?

But in my job, there are always opportunities to learn. By putting on a pair of distorting glasses and by being led blindfold up to St Mary's by volunteers from Bucks Vision, I got some small insight into the challenges faced by people with visual impairments as they navigate over our uneven pavements.

I now enter the final quarter of my Mayoral Term, with much yet to do, and yet with confidence that Aylesbury's very best years lie ahead.

## What's on at Bucks County Museum

Bucks County Museum in Aylesbury old town often has exhibitions on show with work of national and international renown that you would normally have to travel into London to experience. Currently you can see work by the iconic 21st century artist Dame Elisabeth Frink which will be followed by an exhibition of artwork from Terry Pratchett's Discworld novels.

### Elisabeth Frink: sculptures, drawings, prints, 10 February – 21 April

A fantastic opportunity to experience the work of the famous artist Elisabeth Frink (1930-1993). The exhibition brings together themes of horses, heads, human figures and animals through magnificent bronze sculptures, prints and drawings, which explore the impact of war on humans and animals, the expression of emotions and aggression and links with mythology. Highlights include a 2 metre tall bronze warrior, a Goggle Head and Easter Head. Frink's sculptures can be seen in many public spaces and her life-sized sculpture of a black horse stands outside Lloyds Bank in Milton Keynes. Commissioned in 1978, this year marks the 40th anniversary of the Lloyds' commission as well as it being the 25th anniversary of Frink's death.
