

I know that we are already two months into the New Year as I am writing this but I still want to take the opportunity to wish you all the very best for the year that lies ahead. Some of you may have set yourselves goals that you wish to achieve such as taking part in a charity challenge or climbing the career ladder or just being happy and healthy. Whatever it is, I hope you do achieve it.

If your goal for 2019 is to get fitter and spend more time outdoors why not consider becoming an allotment holder? We manage seven allotment sites across the town and have smaller beginner as well as larger plots available. Not only would it help you achieve your goal, the fruit and vegetables you can grow will also taste so much better. For more information about the allotments please call our office and speak with the allotments officer.

Exciting times lie ahead of us for 2019 whilst the new unitary council is being formed and put in place, ready to function from April 2020 onwards. We will of course keep you informed of any changes that may affect the Town Council in terms of devolved services and facilities. As you already know four years ago, the County Council devolved the grass cutting of the street verges to the Town Council and since then the team has delivered at least 10 cuts per year. Let's hope there won't be a 'Beast from the East' this year, which will delay the cutting like it did last year. You may also have seen the team out and about with the Bobcat weed cutting and clearing machine removing weeds that grow in the kerbside. The team will continue this work, in-between grass cutting, throughout the year.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank our team at the Jonathan Page Play Centre for achieving an Ofsted 'Outstanding' rating at their inspection in December. Since the Town Council took over the management and running of the centre in August 2016 their journey has often been a challenging one but I am very proud of the team and children in their care. The team are striving to be the best they can be and to receive this recognition from Ofsted at our first inspection since we took over the management of the centre, is fantastic news.

The Communities Team are planning fantastic events again for 2019, including some changes to some of our regular events such as Aylesbury on Sea and what used to be the walking play. More information will follow in due course and in the meantime we have listed all of our forthcoming events as an easy cut out to stick on your fridge or noticeboard on page 4.

I hope to see many of you at our forthcoming FREE community events or at Council meetings, especially the Annual Town Meeting, which is taking place on Thursday 9 May at 6.30pm. # **Bedgrove's Edible Gardens**

I have two gardens in Bedgrove. One is around my house, full of flowering plants which end up on the compost heap every winter. The other is my allotment, part of Bedgrove's best open secret. Only some of that garden goes into the compost heap. The rest is enjoyed by my family, neighbours and friends who eat it.

Bedgrove's allotments are easily missed by passersby, especially those in cars. Shaped like a crescent moon, right at the edge of town, it is overlooked by residents on the southern side of Ingram Avenue and some of Welbeck Avenue. Many of these lucky people rent allotments from the Town Council, making them effectively extensions to their own back gardens.

There are about 180 plots on the Bedgrove site. I pay about a pound a week for mine and grow almost thirty different types of fruit and vegetable. Without a greenhouse, we can supply ourselves with fresh greens and carbs all year round. Of course, we have to accept seasonal eating, as our forebears did. So squash is on the table every week from November to February, lettuce is

replaced by rocket during the winter months and there is no asparagus after the longest day.

The health benefits of managing an allotment are widely agreed. Just being surrounded by green stuff that is growing makes us feel good. We enjoy the walk from my home through the spinney (another of Bedgrove's open secrets, unknown to non-walkers). It gets us out of the house regularly, as an allotment needs attention every few days all year round. The food tastes much better than it does from the shops, and we save a lot of money by growing most stuff from seed. And it keeps the youngsters away from their screens.

But the most well-kept secret of all, is that there is no waiting list for the Bedgrove allotments. You could start work on yours next weekend! All you have to do is email Kim at **k.colbeck@aylesburytowncouncil.gov.uk** or call on **01296 425678** and arrange for a Warden to show you round and help you select the right plot for you.

The staff, parents and children at the Jonathan Page Play Centre and Aylesbury Town Council started 2019 with a big celebration. At our recent Ofsted inspection on 12 December we achieved an 'Outstanding' rating, for the Quality and Standards of the Early Years Provision at the centre and were rated Outstanding in all three categories: effectiveness of leadership and management; quality of teaching, learning and assessment; personal development, behaviour and welfare.

Ofsted praised in particular the highly effective partnerships we have with staff at schools and nurseries, which children attend and the very detailed understanding of each child's skills and progress, which we build upon to meet the children's individual needs at the centre. The children show exceptional levels of enthusiasm for attending the centre and can't wait to tell visitors all about it and why they like it so much.

Since Aylesbury Town Council took over the centre in 2016 we have worked tirelessly to make changes to ensure the longevity of the centre and compliance with the Early Years Statutory Framework.


Since the results have been announced we have welcomed new children to our After School Club and Playscheme in February, which was great fun. We talked about all things animals and learnt that a giraffe sleeps lying down when they are babies and that adult giraffes occasionally sleep like this too, but not for very long. In reality they never sleep for longer than five minutes at a time in the wild.

Our next Holiday Playscheme takes place during the Easter Holidays from 8 - 23 April (excl. Bank Holidays). # Spotlight on...

This year we're shining a light on local businesses and groups who've made changes to become Dementia-Friendly in Aylesbury.



Our first stop is **Aylesbury Library**. Situated on Walton Street, a short distance from the Bus Station, over the years the library has become a welcome hub of the town. A library is more than just a place where books and magazines 'live'. In recent times, a library has become a place where people gather, communities thrive and knowledge grows.

The newly refurbished library not only boasts a warm, bright and welcoming environment, but subtle changes highlight how Dementia-Friendly this location is. Window stickers remind us this is a Dementia-Friendly location and registered Safe Place where you'll find staff who are Dementia Friends greeting you with a warm and welcoming smile. Regular visitors are frequently addressed by their first name underlining an air of familiarity and routine which people living with Dementia and their carers have said they 'appreciate immensely'.



The physical environment including chairs with armrests to make it easier to sit down, a colourful and engaging sensory wall, refurbished rest rooms with clear signage, and generally more space for visitors and their carers to move around more easily, all come as a welcome benefit in what can sometimes be a busy environment. There are also computers available for visitors who are visually impaired as well as a range of digital device sessions available.

For carers and/or those with a desire to understand more about ageing well in our community, there are a plethora of books on Dementia from various view points, and staff are on hand to help you either locate or reserve a publication. During **Dementia Action Week (20 - 27 May)**, you'll find a

featured display of books to help readers learn more about Dementia as well as Dementia Friends information sessions open to the public. The 45min sessions are free to attend, and explain through five simple messages how to better understand some of the challenges people living with Dementia and their carers may experience on a daily basis.

However, if you're young or old, nothing is more engaging than the Reminisce Collection. This collection of boxes includes memorabilia from as far back as the 1930s right up to 1989. Whether it's DVDs, jigsaws, giant floor games, scrapbooks, annuals, photos or even synthetic smells of strawberry or cherry lipgloss, there'll be a memory with a story to be shared.

We hope we've shone a bright enough light on the library. This is just a snippet about some of the facilities available. To find out more information on general library services, you can speak with a member of staff at the library who'll be happy to help.

Do you have, or do you know someone who has, sight and/or hearing loss and are struggling at home?

We at Action on Hearing Loss deliver Bucks Integrated Sensory Service on behalf of Bucks County Council – a free service working with children, young people and adults with sight loss, hearing loss or dual sensory loss.

We can visit you at home and complete an assessment, which looks at your sensory loss, including:

- Information and advice.
- Equipment to help you stay safe and independent

   loud/flashing doorbells, smoke alarms with
   vibrating pads, talking clocks, portable lamps, sticks
   and canes.
- Mobility training for visually impaired children, young people and adults for safe and independent travel.
- Registration on Bucks County Council sight and hearing loss registers.
- Referral onto more appropriate services which may be able to help with other needs.


Our Buckinghamshire countryside includes Green Belt, the Chiltern Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and precious resources, such as many of the world's rare chalk streams. CPRE Bucks takes action to protect the natural beauty of these landscapes for both people and wildlife. We aim to:

- promote and enhance the character of the Buckinghamshire countryside
- promote a more sustainable approach to land use
- defend the Buckinghamshire countryside from damaging development

Our countryside is under unprecedented threat from the demands of a growing population and economy. Buckinghamshire in particular is under huge pressure from government projects, such as the Oxford-Cambridge Corridor and HS2. There is also political upheaval arising from the government's decision to make Buckinghamshire a Unitary Authority and all the (current) District Councils are in the middle of preparing Local Plans that set out their intentions for house building and industry development over the next 20 years.

CPRE Bucks need volunteers to help us defend the countryside from over building and support the development of sustainable communities. As a volunteer, you could become part of our Creating Sustainable Community campaign, help us apply for grants, raise our profile with the local media or even lend a hand with office admin, help us respond to major planning consultations and monitor planning applications in your area.

# Local artist creates mural for her father to enjoy at Fremantle Court

91-year-old Derek Underdown is enjoying a room with a view at Fremantle Court nursing home in Stoke Mandeville, thanks to the creation of a beautiful mural landscape painted by his daughter Toni Standing.

Derek was responsible for the original design of Vox amps among other engineering feats throughout his career. Having spent time living overseas, he discovered a passion for fossils and minerals in Hong Kong and on returning to the UK in the early 1980s he joined Sussex Mineral and Lapidary Society.



# Is the world ready for The Resurrection of Skinny Ted and the Brothel Creepers?



The third novel by Aylesbury author, Tony Flower, tells the tale of a fictional band that emerged in the early 80s, had a minor hit then disappeared off the face of the earth. The comedy

potential of a bunch of guys in their 50s reforming and attempting to reignite that long extinguished flame is fully realised; but there is also a healthy dose of pathos and a mystery to unravel, as the girl who inhabits their best known song comes back to haunt them.

Along the way we learn the backstories of the band members, reminisce about the antics of former drummer, Stan, God rest his soul, and meet some interesting characters; including Russian reggae's ambassador, Ras Putin; and ex-Hell's Angel, Gabriel.

The story is littered with musical brainteasers that the reader can attempt to unravel, or refer to the helpful notes at the end of each chapter. We are taken on a shambolic journey with the band as they tour the country, but the book is grounded in a fictional equivalent of Aylesbury, where the author grew up and attended the legendary Friars Club. The Resurrection of Skinny Ted and the Brothel Creepers is an enjoyable, easy read, with a number of threads that are brilliantly resolved by some startling twists at the end.



2019 marks the 85th anniversary of the town's oldest swimming club and it's great to see it continue to be successful. Despite the increasing pressures on grass roots clubs, like Aylesbury, to meet high quality standards of both management and coaching professionalism, the club remains very much true to its original objectives. 
