

Wow, wow, wow, the feedback we received after the Parklife Weekend tells us that you loved it, as we did too.





## **Environment**

This year the judging and awarding criteria were changed to be similar to the Royal Horticultural Society ones. According to the overall marks achieved participants were either awarded a certificate, bronze, silver, silver gilt or gold medal. For the full results in each category please see the table opposite.

During their days of looking and marking all gardens the judges also saw some amazing communal gardens, all of them with a different purpose. Two were to provide respite to patients, others were to provide the residents with an area where they can sit and relax or work in the garden whilst fostering community and others brightened up relaxing gastronomy areas. The Florence Nightingale Hospice Charity achieved the highest marks in the communal garden category and were awarded the Mayor's Cup.

The Overall Best Garden winner of the crystal trophy were Mr P & Mrs M Walker. Their garden is a great example of what can be done within a small space. Through the use of containers with a mixture of evergreens, bamboo, ferns, perennials and annuals they created an oasis. Interspersed with a variety of artefacts, mirrors, sculptures and water features it ensures that you see a different aspect of the garden no matter where you look. The runner-up and commendation prizes were also awarded to the recipients during the awards evening.

The judges reiterated that all gardens they had seen throughout the summer were simply stunning and that the love and tender care which goes into them shone through in every aspect.



## **Aylesbury Wombles**

Aylesbury Wombles is the idea of 15 year old Abigail Walker who had been studying the environment at school and wondered how she could help, so her and her dad Richard decided to get some bin bags and go on a litter pick. It continued from there with Abigail asking if they could do this every week and get others involved and then it snowballed. The idea is a bit like parkrun. Meeting up every week and walking together collecting litter and making Aylesbury a cleaner, nicer place to live.

Abigail and Richard want to bring this great community together, and what better way to do this than everyone working together to give their area a spring clean. The Aylesbury Wombles are currently running a five a day campaign where they are asking residents to pick up five pieces of litter a day. Since they started going out on a weekly basis they have collected over 151 bags of litter!



## Call for volunteer drivers for Aylesbury Community Transport scheme

Over 25,000 journeys are made by Community Transport car and bus schemes across the county each year, with the majority taking service users to medical appointments. Since the closure of Red Cross and Royal Voluntary Service transport schemes, demand for help from those unable to take a bus has risen significantly.

**Could you help?** We are looking for volunteer drivers in Aylesbury, where there are currently no car or bus schemes, to be part of a new group providing an essential service in your local community.

As one Community Transport bus volunteer stated: "The best thing about our scheme is that we can offer a service around our villages that means people can get out. Our bus group helps not only to tackle loneliness but also helps people be independent for longer."

Volunteer drivers can claim 45p per mile for all journeys undertaken on behalf of the scheme, plus any parking costs. All you need is a car, driving licence, references and agree to a DBS (police) check.

## Macular Society

#### **Aylesbury Macular Support Group**

This is an Aylesbury-based support group which is run by local people, with the support of and in partnership with the Macular Society the leading sight loss charity, which helps to increase the confidence and independence of people affected by macular disease.

The group offers information, encouragement and friendship to people who are affected by macular disease. The meetings are open to anyone affected by central vision loss and family, friends and carers are very welcome to attend.

The Aylesbury Macular Society Support Group meets from 1 – 3pm at Room 2, Aylesbury Methodist Church, Buckingham Street on the last Wednesday of each month.

Macular disease is the biggest cause of blindness in the UK. Nearly 1.5 million people are currently affected and many more are at risk. The disease can have a devastating effect on people's lives, leaving them unable to drive, read or see faces.

Many people affected describe losing their sight as being similar to bereavement. There is still no cure and most types of the disease are not treatable. Age-related macular degeneration (AMD) is the most common form of macular disease, affecting more than 600,000 people, usually over the age of 50.

## Aylesbury Gardening Society raise funds in memory of Graham Webster



On 21 September, Lymphoma Action were delighted to be presented with a cheque for £730 from the Aylesbury Gardening Society at their Annual Show. The funds had been raised from a potato growing competition organised by the society in memory of their late treasurer, Graham Webster. Graham was a well-known Aylesbury resident, former Town Councillor and Mayor of Aylesbury and a long term supporter of Lymphoma Action, the only charity in the UK dedicated to supporting those affected by the condition.



Over 270 participants took part in the Graham Webster Potato Challenge, where they were asked to make a small donation, and in return received a 17 litre potato growing bag and a potato of choice. The challenge was then on between March and September as to who could grow the heaviest crop! David Ridgway won the first prize of a £10 voucher to spend at the society's Trading Store at the Old Stoke Road allotment site in Aylesbury. He kindly re-donated his winnings, and combined with collections taken on the day, brought the total funds raised to £756. Thomas Baldwin from the 1st Grendon and Edgcott Cubs entered his crop into the Bucks County Show as well and won first prize!

"We wish to say a massive thank you to the Aylesbury Gardening Society, and to all who took part in the Graham Webster Potato Challenge in raising this fantastic amount for our charity" said Amanda Harris, who attended the event on behalf of Lymphoma Action. "Graham was a long term member of Lymphoma Action's Aylesbury support group, and named us as one of his charities of choice during his Mayoral year between 2010 and 2011. We are forever grateful for his support, and remember him as a wonderful man who made a real difference to the community."

## Buckinghamshire Mind is presented with The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service on World Mental Health Day

In June Buckinghamshire Mind was delighted to be one of 10 named local charities, social enterprises and voluntary groups to receive the prestigious The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service, the highest award a voluntary group can receive in the UK.

This award recognises the incredible contribution of the charity's volunteers and the huge benefit they bring to the community. Buckinghamshire Mind has over 500 volunteers who are integral to the delivery of our mental health services. Over 15,000 lives were touched by Buckinghamshire Mind in 2018/19, which couldn't have been achieved without these volunteers.

A celebration was held on World Mental Health Day, 10 October 2019, where Buckinghamshire Mind were honoured to be formally presented with the Crystal Award and Certificate from HM The Queen, given by the Queen's representative Sir Henry Aubrey-Fletcher, KCVO, Bt HM Lord-Lieutenant of Buckinghamshire.

Sir Henry stated: "Buckinghamshire Mind reaches out to some of the most isolated people in the community, working to support and represent those with mental health problems living across the county, with the aim of enabling them to live safe, purposeful and fulfilled lives. Buckinghamshire Mind works hard to ensure its volunteers are well supported to get the most out of their experiences and to ensure they know their contribution is valued and appreciated."

Alongside celebrating this amazing achievement, the event's presentations highlighted World Mental Health Day (WMHD). Mental health problems can affect anyone, any day of the year, and this is a day to show support for better mental health and to start looking after your own wellbeing.



WMHD 2019 focus is on suicide and suicide prevention. Every year close to 800,000 people globally take their own life and there are many more people who attempt suicide. Every suicide is a tragedy that affects families, communities and has long-lasting effects on the people left behind. It's the leading cause of death among young people aged 20-34 years in the UK and is the second leading cause of death among 15-29 year-olds globally.

Andrea McCubbin CEO for Buckinghamshire Mind said, "The scale and range of services that Buckinghamshire Mind delivers continues to grow. The key components of our strategy will be to complement the local view of the NHS long-term plan, whilst continuing to amplify our service user voice, build our relationships with key stakeholders and deliver the quality mental health services that the people in Buckinghamshire need."

Patron of Buckinghamshire Mind, Anthony Seldon, Vice-Chancellor, University of Buckingham commented, "I am overjoyed by the wonderful news that Buckinghamshire Mind has received The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service. As the highest award that any voluntary group can receive, it is further proof of the very high quality and important work that is undertaken. I am deeply proud to be Patron of Buckinghamshire Mind, and hope you have a wonderful presentation today."


