






October Half Term Playscheme



On Sunday 28 April, Aylesbury honoured personnel from RAF Halton with a special parade commemorating the Freedom of Aylesbury.

The Freedom of Aylesbury was bestowed upon RAF Halton in 1956. The honour and distinction of marching through the streets of Aylesbury with a full ceremonial parade, bayonets fixed, King's Colours flying, drums beating and band playing solidifies the important relationship that the Station has with the town. The Central Band of the Royal Air Force led the parade, followed by the apprentices and staff of RAF Halton with the King's Colours on parade.

Invited dignitaries included HM Lord-Lieutenant the Countess Howe, High Sheriff of Buckinghamshire Kurshida Mizra BEM and Wing Commander Peter Seanor RAF Halton along with other representatives from Town Councils and other organisations.



The Freedom of Aylesbury scroll was read by Town Clerk Keith Gray, followed by speeches from the former Mayor of Aylesbury, Cllr Steven Lambert and Wing Commander Peter Seanor RAF Halton. Aylesbury Consort of Voices sang a heartfelt rendition of Jerusalem before the Central Band of the RAF conducted a march around Market Square.

LOCAL STUDENTS EMBRACE **GARDENING CHALLENGE**



In June, Aylesbury in Bloom Garden Competition judges Heather Murray and Ron Murray visited schools in the parish of Aylesbury to evaluate the students' gardening efforts. They awarded points to each school, determining whether they would receive a bronze, silver, silver gilt or gold award.

Thomas Hickman School

Recreational/Learning Garden (Silver), Wildlife Garden (Silver), Edible Garden (Silver)

The judges said: "We were impressed to see that the school has a Gardening Club. There was plenty of evidence of environmentally sound practices such as recycling, water conservation and the use of peat free compost. We felt a great sense of community – with parents and staff donating plants to the garden."

"It was clear to see that the students have been very involved in creating a new wildflower area for example, learning carpentry skills when they constructed a fence. The plant labels made from decorated stones were excellent! The wildflower area was very colourful and had a wide variety of plants. The vegetables and herbs that they grow are used in the cafeteria which is great to see."

ADDING A SPLASH OF COLOUR TO OUR TOWN

We're so proud of our utility cabinet painting project. In the last year, we've had local artists of all ages and experiences creating masterpieces on our streets.



OXFORD ROAD

"I saw how the cabinets brought colour and a bit of fun to places; the unique style of the artists involved makes each place special and when I was painting there were so many people who told me how much they loved the cabinets and how happy they made them. I feel fortunate to have been able to be a part of this wonderful project! I hope I can make people happy with this design and bring a bit of brightness to people's walks.

"I went with the classic Aylesbury duck – such a charming and lovely duck, if you're ever lucky enough to meet one – I've been lucky and have met two, but they are sadly endangered. The background is of the black poplar - an endangered tree, with about 50% of Britain's population in the Vale of Aylesbury. I found that such a humbling fact, that we have two endangered species here, and wanted to pay homage to them. The background goes through the different stages of the female black poplar, with the catkins, cotton puffs, autumn leaves and winter branches (spring, summer, autumn, winter seasons, roughly). Thank you, Aylesbury Town Council, for allowing me to be involved in this project."





The ceremony, held annually, inaugurated the new Mayor and Deputy Mayor of Aylesbury. Cllr Alan Sherwell is the new Mayor of Aylesbury for 2024-25 and Cllr Nidhi Mehta is the new Deputy Mayor.

Read Easy Chilterns, a small but rapidly growing charity, offers free, confidential one-to-one coaching for adults to improve their reading skills. This support, available either face-to-face or online, is provided by a fantastic team of volunteers at approved community venues such as libraries. Readers progress at their own pace until they are ready to move on. Volunteer coaches receive training and are supported by the Read Easy Chilterns team.

A reader shared: "The person who pushed me forward after seeing the programme is my wife. She arranged everything and pushed me to take a leap of faith and to face a fear I had carried all my life. My reading has come on in leaps and bounds, from someone too scared to even open a book I am now reading my first book, thanks to my coach, my wife, and the rest of the team."

AYLESBURY HOMELESS ACTION GROUP (AHAG)

Aylesbury Homeless Action Group (AHAG) has been a vital force in Buckinghamshire since its inception in 1992. Sadly, homelessness is on the rise, with Buckinghamshire Council carrying out the fourth highest number of homelessness assessments in England last year. Demand for our services has surged, with 230 individuals assisted in 2019 and over 520 in 2023, a huge escalation in

However, amidst these challenges, there is hope. In 2023, AHAG helped 71 people from homelessness into stable housing and prevented evictions for 29 households, including Janet who was living in an uninhabitable home without running water and due to be sold. We helped her to get somewhere else to live before being made homeless.



Every time we prevent a person becoming homeless, we save an estimated £20,000-£30,000 for the local economy. By the end of 2024, our dedicated team will have aided over 700 local households.

AHAG envisions a future where homelessness is eradicated, and every individual finds acceptance and support within their community. Together, we work tirelessly towards this goal. CPJ Field isn't just a familyrun funeral service, they also support and facilitate these groups as part of their extensive community engagement programme, 'Never Alone'.

The groups are all free and only require you to turn up to join and enjoy. In one month, Maria would come into contact with 537 people through these groups. These people often become friends and have some structure to their week, a reason to leave the house and to meet with other likeminded people in the local community. Recently the Knit and Natter group knitted 4,000 items for use in NICU, where very premature babies receive items such as woollen hats and blankets using donated wool.

BOOSTING MEN'S MENTAL FITNESS THROUGH **OPEN** CONVERSATIONS



Talk Club is a talking and listening community for men. It's about male mental fitness - just like physical fitness, but for your brain. It's regular blokes talking about their stresses and worries in a positive safe space.

Talk Club groups are run by trained captains and are based around four simple questions:

- 1. How are you? Out of 10?
- 2. What are the positives in your life?
- 3. What are your plans for mental fitness this week?
- 4. Before we finish, we ask again: How are you? Out of 10?
- On average, sessions last two hours.
- Everyone takes a turn to talk others listen.
- It might take a few meetings for it to start to work... but, you don't get fit by going to the gym once.
- You don't have to wait until you're going through a disaster to join Talk Club.

Talk Club Aylesbury meet on the first Thursday of every month at Ashmead School, HP21 8SU from 7-9pm.

Simply Walk, which is run by Buckinghamshire Council, celebrates 22 years this summer. It is completely free and there are now more than 65 organised walks, including three in Aylesbury. For full details, visit buckinghamshire.gov.uk/simply-walk, and register. If you don't have access to a computer, just turn up and get a registration form from the Walk Leader.

Walking is a fantastic way to get out and about and meet new people while improving your health and wellbeing. Our trained volunteer leaders are there to help you walk at your own pace – so don't worry about being left behind. For the Aylesbury beginner, we recommend the Fairford Leys walk which operates every Monday at 10:30am from the Community Centre. This lasts about an hour. For the fitter walkers, the Bedgrove walk happens every Tuesday from outside the Bucks Yeoman pub in Jansel Square and departs at 12 noon. This lasts about an hour, but at a faster pace. For the more ambitious, the Bedgrove Fortnightly Walk meets outside the Co-op on every other Friday and departs at 11am. This 90 minute walk takes you into the countryside, so you need to wear the appropriate footwear.

MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Every Mayor says that it is a pleasure and a privilege to be elected to the post. Just because this is a cliché does not make it any less true. I am very conscious that, as Mayor, I represent not just the Council but the town itself to both its people and the wider world.

I have lived in our town for 42 years and been a Councillor for 21 of them. I have learned a lot about Aylesbury, its history and its residents in that time but perhaps the most striking thing is that so many people volunteer in so many different ways to tackle disadvantage, provide opportunities for others or just make Aylesbury an even better place to live. As Mayor, I would love to support all these initiatives and activities but, while I do in spirit, there is nowhere near enough time to do so physically. As this article is written in May, I have only been in post a couple of weeks and have attended just a few functions. I have, however, met with my chosen charity for the year, Pace, who do wonderful work changing the lives of children with neurodisabilities – some of the equipment that they have to help the development of these youngsters is truly mind blowing. You will be seeing Pace at our Aylesbury Town Council events this year and will be hearing more about them too.

One of the events that I have been to was an inspirational briefing by the Florence Nightingale Hospice Charity. I met lots of brilliant people who either raise funds to support top quality end of life care, administer the charity or directly provide the care. Very humbling but also providing an illustration of how a charity can raise funds in a way that helps more than just their core purpose. Many readers will remember the performance of The Wiz that they arranged at the Waterside last year. It brought in good money for their cause but also gave over 100 young children the opportunity to perform in public – something that they would, almost certainly, never have had otherwise. Two birds with one stone!

I will do all I can to support our Town Centre Officer in her work with local businesses. Aylesbury, like all towns, will continue to change as shopping and working habits alter but the need for the Town Council to talk with local businesses, network with them and support them where we can, will only grow. The Council's town centre events bring customers to many of our shops and they, in turn, are a key part of our community.

Another priority area for me is youth opportunity in all its forms. We have many great organisations in Aylesbury that support young people in different ways - Youth Concern, Youth Action, the uniformed youth groups, the Young Enterprise competition and so on. I am not sure that knowledge of the activities/groups is as well spread as it might be and, while I certainly have no desire to interfere with any of them, I am sure that the Mayoralty can help promote them in a co-operative way.

That leads on to an area where additional communication might be really helpful and that is work experience. I know from my role as a secondary school governor that many Year 10 students find it difficult to get work experience and I suspect that many businesses are reluctant to offer it because they don't fully understand what would be required of them. Yet the Town Council has really good contacts with many local businesses and, whilst it is not part of our role to actually organise work experience, I will be looking into the possibility of improving the links between businesses and schools to the benefit of all.



Aylesbury Cycling UK is looking for new members for its 2024 spring/ summer season. People from all walks of life ride with the group, you don't need a fancy bike or to be sporty. The rides are a great way to meet new people, enjoy our lovely countryside and develop confidence by riding in a group.
